



The life and accomplishments of Sadie Tanner Mossell Alexander

Sadie Tanner Mossell Alexander was born into a distinguished family on January 2, 1898 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Sadie's father was the first black man to be awarded a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania. Her grandfather was Bishop Benjamin Tucker Tanner (1835-1923), editor of the Christian Recorder and the AME Church Review. Her uncle was surgeon Dr. Nathan F. Mossell (1856-1946), founder of the Frederick Douglass Hospital (now Mercy-Douglass Hospital), and her aunt, Dr. Hallie Tanner Johnson (1864-1901), founded **Tuskegee Institute's** Nurses' School & Hospital. Other uncles were the painter, Henry Ossawa Tanner (1859-1937) and Lewis Baxter Moore (1866-1928), Dean of **Howard University**.

Name: <u>Alabama A & M University</u> Location: Normal, Alabama Type: 4-year, Public Campus Setting: Mid-sized City

Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University (AAMU) is a historic, student-friendly and community-focused institution of higher learning. Reflecting on its heritage as a historical black college and university (HBCU) and a traditional 1890 land-grant institution, AAMU functions as a teaching, research and public service institution, including extension. Founded in 1875 by a former slave, Dr. William Hooper Councill, AAMU is a dynamic and progressive institution with a strong commitment to academic excellence. The serene, intimate campus is situated on "The Hill," only a short distance from downtown Huntsville, the site of the school's founding.

Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University provides more than 60 undergraduate, graduate and certificate programs and concentrations, a diverse international faculty, 50 plus student organizations, and an extensive alumni network comprised of politicians, educators, entrepreneurs, doctors, lawyers, engineers, scientists, authors, artist, and more, many of whom are change agents on the local, national and international stage.



Dr. Hadiyah-Nicole Green, one of the first African American women in the nation to earn a Ph.D. in physics, holds the distinction of being only the second African American woman and the fourth African American to receive a Ph.D. in physics from the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB). She humbly served as Miss **Alabama A&M University** 2002-2003 and is a proud member of **Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc**. After serving two years at **Tuskegee University** in the Departments of Physics and Materials Science and Engineering, she is currently an Assistant Professor at **Morehouse** School of Medicine in the Department of Surgery.

Beyond her academic role, she founded a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, the <u>Ora Lee Smith Cancer</u> <u>Research Foundation</u>; named in memory of her late aunt who raised her. Dr. Green has intertwined her life's purpose into the mission of the organization: "*To change the way cancer is treated and reduce the suffering of cancer patients by providing a treatment that is accessible, affordable, and most importantly, effective.*"

Name: <u>Alabama State University</u> Location: Montgomery, Alabama Type: 4-year, Public Campus Setting: Mid-sized City Net Price: \$13,476* Alabama State University, located in Montgomery, Ala., is a widely respected, world-class institution of higher learning which welcomes students of all races. **ASU** offers nearly 50 undergraduate and graduate degree programs, from the historic teacher education program to new, high-demand programs, such as the Ph.D. in microbiology and international business. The students who attend **ASU** are as diverse as its academic offerings, with students from more than 40 states and various countries seeking a top-notch education that extends far beyond the walls of a classroom.

ASU's 153-year history is a legacy of perseverance, progress and promise. The **ASU** movement began with the impetus to establish a school for black Alabamians. **ASU** is the global entity it is today because of the fortitude of nine freed slaves from Marion, Ala., who sought to build a school for African-Americans previously denied the right to an education. The University is proud of its legacy, and it welcomes students to dream, to share their unique gifts and talents, and to take pride in knowing they are part of a rich tradition.



Rev. Dr. Gwendolyn Elizabeth Boyd, the 22nd National President of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., is an engineer and is described as a dynamic and relevant leader, a prolific motivational speaker, a powerful preacher and a prominent advocate for STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education. Rev. Dr. Boyd is a native of Montgomery, Alabama and received a full scholarship to attend **Alabama State University** where she graduated summa cum laude with a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics with a double minor in physics and music. She received a full fellowship to pursue graduate studies at Yale University where she was the first African American female to earn a M. S. degree in Mechanical Engineering. She earned both the Master of Divinity and the Doctor of Ministry degrees from **Howard University**. Additionally, she has been awarded Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from **Lincoln University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff**.

Rev. Dr. Gwendolyn Boyd is a nationally recognized champion of education. In March 2009, Boyd was selected by **President Barack Obama** to serve as a trustee to the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Foundation. In January 2014, **President Obama** appointed Boyd to serve on the President's Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for African Americans.



Name: <u>Albany State University</u> Location: Albany, Georgia Type: 4-year, Public Campus Setting: Small City Net Price: \$12,500* Founded in 1903, **Albany State University** continues to provide leadership in academic excellence, social change, and economic impact. A nationally top-ranked HBCU, ASU serves an increasingly diverse student body and community by offering a uniquely comprehensive array of programs, from associate to graduate degrees. Joseph Winthrop Holley, the institution's founder and first president, established the Albany Bible and Manual Training Institute in Albany, Georgia.


William Leonard Roberts II was born in Clarksdale, Mississippi, and raised in Carol City, Florida. After graduating from Miami Carol City Senior High School, he attended the HBCU **Albany State University** on a football scholarship. **Roberts** worked as a correctional officer for 18 months from December 1995 until his resignation in June 1997. Prior to releasing his debut single "*Hustlin*" in 2006, **Rick Ross** was the subject of a bidding war, receiving offers from Diddy's Bad Boy Entertainment and others, until signing a multimillion-dollar deal with *Jay-Z*'s *Def Jam Recordings*. His meteoric rise in the rap game was due in part to his multi-million-dollar deal with *Def Jam Records* as well as his first two albums, "*Port of Miami*" and "*Trilla*," debuted in top spots on the *Billboard 200 charts*.

The self-proclaimed "*Biggest Boss*" **Rick Ross** is continuing to expand his entrepreneurial reach with the grand opening of his latest *WingStop* location in his own Mississippi hometown. The rapper - entrepreneur currently owns over a dozen *WingStop* locations in the Southeastern United States and his newest location is right in the heart of Clarksdale, MS! *Wingstop* is part of the reason **Ross** is one of *Hip-Hop's Cash Kings for the sixth year in a row*. His poultry profits are far from paltry. Along with his touring income, recorded music sales and other ventures, they helped him rack up about \$7 million annually!



Name: <u>Alcorn State University</u> Location: Lorman, Mississippi Type: 4-year, Public Campus Setting: Rural Net Price: \$13,907* **Alcorn** is the oldest public HBCU land-grant institution in the United States and the second-oldest state-supported institution of higher learning in Mississippi. **Alcorn** University was founded in 1871 as a result of the people of Mississippi's efforts to educate the descendants of formerly enslaved Africans. It was named in honor of the sitting governor of Mississippi, James L. Alcorn.

Alcorn has nationwide recognition for excellence in liberal arts, agricultural research, technology, music and nursing. The University emphasizes intellectual development and lifelong learning through the integration of diverse pedagogies, applied and basic research, cultural and professional programs, public service and outreach, while providing access to globally competitive academic and research programs. **Alcorn** strives to prepare graduates to be well-rounded future leaders of high character and to be successful in the global marketplace of the 21st century.



Medgar Wiley Evers, an American black civil-rights activist whose assassination made him a martyr to the cause of the civil rights movement, served in the U.S. Army in Europe during World War II. Afterward, he and his elder brother, Charles Evers, both graduated from Alcorn Agricultural and **Mechanical College (now Alcorn State University)** in 1950. They settled in Philadelphia, Miss., and engaged in various business pursuits: **Medgar** was an insurance salesman, and Charles operated a restaurant, a gas station, and other enterprises. Simultaneously, the brothers began organizing local affiliates of the **National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP)**. They worked quietly at first, slowly building a base of support; in 1954, **Medgar** moved to Jackson to become the NAACP's first field secretary in Mississippi. He traveled throughout the state recruiting members and organizing voter-registration drives and economic boycotts.

During the early 1960s, the increased tempo of civil rights activities in the South created high and constant tensions, and in Mississippi conditions were often at the breaking point. On June 12, 1963, a few hours after President John F. Kennedy had made an extraordinary broadcast to the nation on the subject of civil rights, Medgar Evers was shot and killed in an ambush in front of his home. The murder made Evers, until then a hardworking and effective but relatively obscure figure outside Mississippi, a nationally known figure. He was buried with full military honors in Arlington National Cemetery and awarded the **1963 Spingarn Medal of the NAACP**. In 2017, **President Barack Obama** designated **Evers'** home a national historic landmark.

Allen University was founded by the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church in 1870. The University has a distinguished history, rich in the tradition of promoting spiritual growth and training men and women to become productive leaders in an ever-changing society. Manifesting the dream of Daniel Alexander Payne, an apostle of black education in the United States, Allen University educated men and women for stellar leadership and service.

Allen University is an academic community which provides students an opportunity to obtain baccalaureate and graduate degrees in liberal arts and professional programs in traditional and distance education formats. The University has a strong unalterable commitment to teaching in delivery of its baccalaureate and graduate programs.



Dr. Margaret Abner Dixon was born in Columbia, S.C., and graduated from **Allen University**. In the 1950s, she joined the New York City public school system. She was a teacher of physically challenged students, director of a computer-assisted early learning program and principal of a Brooklyn elementary school.

She worked first in the *AARP Minority Affairs Initiative*, where she encouraged greater participation in AARP activities by racial and ethnic minorities. **Dr. Dixon** was a volunteer for eight years before her two-year term as president of AARP, a nonprofit advocacy organization for people older than 50 which claims more than 40 million members.

As *AARP President*, she was leader of an organization said to wield vast influence and power on Capitol Hill and within the executive branch. During her years as AARP President, **Dr. Dixon** testified before congressional committees dealing with matters affecting senior citizens and kept a close watch on measures that might affect the lives of elderly Americans, such as amendments or changes in Social Security or Medicare.

Arkansas Baptist College, originally named the Minister's Institute, was founded in 1884 by the Colored Baptists of Arkansas during their annual convention at Mount Zion Baptist Church in Little Rock. The primary objective of the institute was to raise the educational level within the Negro Ministry. The secondary objective was to aid the state in making higher education available to young Negro men and women.





Name: <u>Bennett College</u> Location: Greensboro, North Carolina **Type:** 4-year, Private Campus Setting: Large City

In 1873, **Bennett College** had its beginning in the unfinished basement of the Warnersville Methodist Episcopal Church (now known as St. Matthews United Methodist Church). Seventy young men and women started elementary and secondary level studies. In 1874, the Freedmen's Aid Society took over the school which remained under its auspices for 50 years.

Within five years of 1873, a group of emancipated slaves purchased the present site for the school. College level courses and permanent facilities were added. Currently, **Bennett College** prepares women of color through a transformative liberal arts education to lead with purpose, integrity, and a strong sense of self-worth. **Bennett** provides educational access to students while promoting inquiry, civic engagement, social justice, lifelong learning, and equity for all.

Name: <u>Bethune-Cookman</u> <u>University</u> Location: Daytona Beach, Florida Type: 4-year, Private Campus Setting: Small City Net Price: \$16,515* On October 3, 1904, *a very determined young black woman*, **Mary McLeod Bethune**, opened the Daytona Literary and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls. Through Dr. Bethune's lifetime, the school underwent several stages of growth and development. In 1923, it merged with Cookman Institute of Jacksonville, Florida and in 1925 both schools collaborated to become the Daytona-Cookman Collegiate Institute. In 1931, Daytona-Cookman Collegiate Institute became accredited by the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States as a Junior College and in 1931, the school's name was officially changed to Bethune-Cookman College to reflect the leadership of Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune.

Bethune-Cookman University recognizes the strength of synergy between scholarly works and education and seeks to foster a culture that values the integration of research and education. The commitment to connecting scholarship and education is critical to academic excellence.

Bethune-Cookman University seeks to define a new standard for academic excellence as a way to become the best small college in the southern region. To educate and empower people to seek their own solutions; to advocate for opportunities for all citizens to improve their quality of life, and to inculcate an international perspective that would facilitate a keen appreciation of the new global realities.







Mary McLeod Bethune

Mary McLeod Bethune was born on a South Carolina farm in 1875 and was the 15th child of former slaves. She rose from humble beginnings to become a world-renowned educator, civil and human rights leader, champion for women and youth, and an **advisor to five U.S. presidents**.

Mary McLeod worked in the fields alongside her parents and siblings. She enrolled in the one-room Trinity Presbyterian Mission School where she learned to read and later studied at **Barber-Scotia College** in North Carolina and Moody Bible Institute in Chicago. Miss McLeod was a teacher in Augusta, Georgia and then in Sumpter, South Carolina, where she met and married Albertus Bethune. She dreamed of opening her own school and relocated to Florida where she started the school that would become **Bethune-Cookman University**.

Bethune served as president of the State Federation of Colored Women's Clubs and organized the group to fight against school segregation and inadequate healthcare for black children. She later served as president of the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs and founded the National Council of Negro Women. Mrs. Bethune was appointed to numerous national commissions including President Calvin Coolidge Administration's Child Welfare Conference and President Herbert Hoover Administration's National Commission on Child Welfare and Commission on Home Building and Home Ownership. She was an advisor on minority affairs in President Franklin D. Roosevelt's Administration.

Bethune was awarded the **1935 Spingarn Medal of the NCCAP** for outstanding leadership and service to education. She was the only black woman present at the founding of the **United Nations**. In 1949, she became the first woman to receive the **National Order of Honor and Merit**, Haiti's highest award. Among her honors was serving as an assistant director of the Women's Army Corps. She was also an honorary member of **Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc**.

Dr. Bethune relied on faith and prayer for guidance and inspiration, stating, "Without faith, nothing is possible. With it, nothing is impossible." <u>Dr. Bethune's Last Will and Testament</u> reflects her love of life and the gifts she offered humanity. <u>Learn more about Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune's remarkable life</u>.



Upon graduation, Vance worked as a teacher in the Philadelphia Public Schools, and was then hired as a print journalist for The Philadelphia Independent. During this time, he also worked weekends at the radio station WHAT-AM. In 1968, Vance moved to WKBS-TV in Philadelphia, where he served as a reporter and interviewed Muhammad Ali. The following year, Vance joined WRC-TV NBC 4 in Washington, D.C., where he worked for over *forty-five years*!

At WRC-TV, Vance worked as co-anchor with Glenn Rinker between 1972 and 1976, and then as a coanchor with Sue Simmons from 1976 to 1980. *Vance and Simmons were one of the first African American co-anchors of a major market newscast*. From 1989 until his earthly transition, Vance co-anchored with Doreen Gentzler and they were the longest-running anchor team in Washington, D.C.

Vance earned numerous awards and honors, including 17 Emmys and membership in the Silver Circle of the Washington Chapter of the National Association of Television Arts and Sciences. He holds the *Ted Yates Award for Outstanding Community Service* and has been honored as "*Washingtonian of the Year*." **Vance** was inducted into the *National Association of Black Journalists Hall of Fame in 2007*, and on May 2, 2008, he was inducted into the *National Alumni Hall of Fame of Cheyney University of Pennsylvania*. He also appeared in the documentaries, *Without Bias, The Nine Lives of Marion Barry*, and the feature film: *State of Play*.



At Ashbrook, Armstrong was a punter and wide receiver on the football team. Armstrong then attended **Fayetteville State University** and joined the football team as a walk-on placekicker. Armstrong played football for the 1986 and 1987 seasons and twice kicked school-record 48-yard field goals. In 1988, Armstrong joined the Fayetteville State basketball team and would play three seasons under coach Jeff Capel II. In his senior season of 1990–91, Armstrong played 24 games and averaged 16.4 points, 3.6 rebounds, and 4.7 assists. Armstrong was the **CIAA Slam Dunk Champion** in 1990 and a **first-team All-CIAA selection** in 1991.

Darrell Eugene Armstrong was not selected in the 1991 NBA draft and began his career with the Atlanta Eagles of the United States Basketball League (USBL) in 1991. Armstrong first signed with the NBA as a free agent for the Orlando Magic in late 1994–95. On January 26, 2009, a year after retiring, he became the **Player Development Assistant Coach for the Dallas Mavericks**. Armstrong went on to help coach the Dallas Mavericks to win the **2011 NBA Finals**.




W. E. B. DuBois

William Edward Burghardt DuBois was an American civil rights activist, leader, Pan-Africanist, sociologist, educator, historian, writer, editor, poet, and scholar. He was born and raised in Great Barrington, Massachusetts. In 1905, DuBois was a founder and general secretary of the Niagara Movement, an African American protest group of scholars and professionals. DuBois founded and edited the Moon (1906) and the Horizon (1907-1910) as organs for the Niagara Movement. In 1909, DuBois was among the founders of the NAACP and from 1910 to 1934 served as director of publicity and research, a member of the board of directors, and *founder and editor of The Crisis*, its monthly magazine. *The Crisis* is the same publication that employed Langston Hughes; a Lincoln University graduate. In '*The Crisis*,' DuBois directed a constant stream of agitation–often bitter and sarcastic–at white Americans while serving as a source of information and pride to African Americans. The magazine always published young African American writers. Racial protest during the decade following World War I focused on securing anti-lynching legislation. During this period, the NAACP was the leading protest organization and DuBois its leading figure.

In 1934, **DuBois** resigned from the NAACP board and from '*The Crisis*' because of his new advocacy of an African American nationalist strategy that ran in opposition to the NAACP's commitment to integration. However, he returned to the NAACP as director of special research from 1944 to 1948. During this period, he was active in placing the grievances of African Americans before the United Nations, serving as a consultant to the UN founding convention (1945) and writing the famous "An Appeal to the World" (1947). **DuBois** identified as a socialist and belonged to the Socialist Party from 1910 to 1912. **DuBois'** life and work were an inseparable mixture of scholarship, protest activity, and polemics. All of his efforts were geared toward gaining equal treatment for black people in a world dominated by whites and toward marshaling and presenting evidence to refute the myths of racial inferiority.

From his earliest years, **DuBois** was a prolific, gifted scholar. In 1884, **DuBois** graduated from high school as valedictorian. He received his Bachelor of Arts from Fisk University in Nashville, Tenn., in 1888, having spent summers teaching in African American schools in Nashville's rural areas. In 1888, he entered Harvard University as a junior, took a bachelor of arts cum laude in 1890, and was one of six commencement speakers. From 1892 to 1894, he pursued graduate studies in history and economics at the University of Berlin on a Slater Fund fellowship. He served for two years as professor of Greek and Latin at Wilberforce University in Ohio. DuBois received his Master of Arts from Harvard in 1891, and in 1895, he became the first African American to receive a doctorate from the university. His dissertation, "The Suppression of the African Slave Trade to the United States of America, 1638-1870," was published as No. 1 in the Harvard Historical Series. In 1896-1897, DuBois became assistant instructor in sociology at the University of Pennsylvania. There, he conducted the pioneering sociological study of an urban community, published as The Philadelphia Negro: A Social Study (1899). These first two works assured **DuBois** a place among America's leading scholars. He became a naturalized citizen of Ghana in 1963 at the age of 95 – the year of his death. DuBois died in Ghana on Aug. 27, 1963, on the eve of the civil rights march in Washington, D.C. He was given a state funeral, at which Kwame Nkrumah remarked that he was "a phenomenon."

She has also been profiled by Atlanta Magazine, Georgia Trend Magazine, Ebony Magazine, Essence Magazine, and Politico Magazine, where she was named "the most prominent black female executive in the South – and one of the few in the entire country."

Leading with a progressive agenda focused on equity and affordable housing, **Mayor Bottoms** serves as *Chair of the Community Development and Housing Committee* for the United States Conference of Mayors. She was also invited to join the prestigious Concordia Summit, where she shared the stage with global leaders discussing the importance of public-private solutions to the immigration crisis.

Mayor Bottoms' notable accomplishments to date include the establishment of the City's first fullystaffed Office of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion, the appointments of a LGBTQ Affairs Coordinator and a Human Trafficking Fellow, the citywide elimination of cash bail bond, the closure of the Atlanta City Detention Center to ICE detainees, and the rollout of the most far-reaching financial transparency platform in the City's history – Atlanta's Open Checkbook. A product of Atlanta Public Schools, **Mayor Bottoms** graduated from Frederick Douglass High School and received her undergraduate degree from **Florida A&M University**. She earned her Juris Doctorate from Georgia State University College of Law.

An active member of the community, Mayor Bottoms is a member of the State Bar of Georgia, *Jack and Jill of America*, *The Links*, *Inc.*, and **Delta Sigma Theta Sorority**, **Incorporated**. She has also served on the board of Families First and shares her personal story of adoption and advocates on behalf of adoption and foster care. Mayor Bottoms is the daughter of Sylvia Robinson and R&B icon Major Lance. She resides in historic Southwest Atlanta with her husband, Derek W. Bottoms, their four children-Lance, Langston, Lennox and Lincoln, and their family dog, Logan.

He earned a graduate degree in Criminal Justice Administration from **Clark Atlanta University**. As Chairman Emeritus of **100 Black Men of America, Inc.** and President and Chief Executive Officer of **TWD, Inc**., Dortch has established himself as a leader by diligently working to dismantle systemic barriers to empowerment. Under his guidance, 100 Black Men of America expanded to include 102 chapters throughout the US, Africa, England and the West Indies. Formed in 1986, the mission of the "100" is to improve the quality of life and enhance the educational and economic opportunities for African-Americans.

Mr. Dortch launched his formal career in 1972, writing proposals and developing fund raising projects for the State of Georgia that sought to aid marginalized members of society. He became the Associate Director of the Democratic Party of Georgia in 1974 where during his four-year tenure he assisted in the creation of the first charter for the state party and wrote the first Affirmative Action and Compliance Review Program for the Party. In 1978, Mr. Dortch began working with U.S. Senator Sam Nunn by providing technical assistance at conferences, meetings, and public hearings. In 1990, he became the State Director and served as chief administrator over five field offices and one state office. Mr. Dortch was the *first African American* to serve in this capacity for the United States Senate.

It was founded by the North Louisiana Colored Agriculture Relief Association and organized in 1896 by a group of African-American farmers who wanted to organize and operate a school for African Americans in their region of the state. In response to the Association's request for assistance, **Tuskegee Institute's Booker T. Washington** sent **Charles P. Adams** to help the group organize an industrial school. Adams became its founding president.

Grambling State University is a comprehensive, public HBCU that offers a broad spectrum of undergraduate and graduate programs of study. Through its undergraduate major courses of study, which are undergirded by a traditional liberal arts program, and through its graduate school, which has a decidedly professional focus, the University embraces its founding principle of educational opportunity.



Erykah Badu is best known as an American R&B singer-songwriter who was instrumental in the creation and rise of the neo soul sub-genre. She has released singles like "On & On," "*Honey*," and "*The Healer*." She was born on February 26, 1971 in Dallas, TX. She has been compared to Billie Holiday as a musician. She became invested in her cultural roots at age fourteen, which heavily influenced her music. After graduating from **Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts**, Badu went on to study theater at **Grambling State University**.

Although she disputes the term, Erykah Badu has been dubbed "**the first lady of neo-soul**" and "**the queen of neo-soul**. *Baduizm's* commercial and critical success earned Erykah Badu popularity at the time and helped establish her as one of the emerging neo soul genre's leading artists. Along with D'Angelo's Brown Sugar (1995) and Maxwell's Urban Hang Suite (1996), the album has been recognized by music writers for beginning neo soul's popularity and helping the genre obtain commercial visibility at the time. Erykah Badu's song "*Master Teacher*" popularized the expression **stay woke** in the meaning of to continue to be "*self-aware, questioning the dominant paradigm and striving for something better.*"

The newly issued Emancipation Proclamation was first read to a gathering under the historic tree in 1863. The tree, now a symbol of the university and city, is part of the National Historic Landmark District at Hampton University.

While Hampton's roots reach deep into the history of this nation and the African-American experience, the University's sights – like its students – are set squarely on the horizons of the global community of the 21st century. Rich in history, steeped in tradition, **Hampton University** is a dynamic, progressive institution of higher education, providing a broad range of technical, liberal arts, and graduate degree programs. In addition to being one of the top HBCUs in the world, **Hampton University** is a tightly-knit community of learners and educators, representing 49 states and 35 territories and nations.



Mathematician Mary Winston Jackson was one of a small group of African American women who worked as aeronautical engineers, called "human computers," at NASA during the Space Age. Jackson excelled academically in a time of racial segregation. Mary Jackson earned bachelor's degrees in mathematics and physical science from Hampton University in 1942. She was a member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha, Sorority, Inc. Her math and science skills earned her a position as NASA's first Black female engineer. Along with serving a vital role in the development of the space program, she helped other women and minorities advance their careers. The story of her groundbreaking contributions to NASA was later dramatized in the 2016 film Hidden Figures. Though President Franklin D. Roosevelt's Executive Order 8802 prohibited discrimination in the defense industry, Virginia state law still enforced segregation in the workplace. All work facilities had separate restrooms and cafeterias designated "white" or "colored." In the company cafeteria, whites could select their food choices and sit in a lunchroom. Black people had to make their food requests to a cafeteria attendant and then go back to their desks and eat, an experience Jackson considered an indignity. After several months of "separate and unequal" accommodations, Jackson had had enough. She considered resigning, but a chance encounter with a supervisor changed her mind. After hearing her complaints, he invited her to work for him and she accepted. He quickly saw her potential and encouraged her to take engineering classes. In time, she was promoted to aeronautical engineer, making her NASA's first Black female engineer, and developed expertise working with wind tunnels and analyzing data on aircraft flight experiments. In 2019, Jackson was posthumously awarded the Congressional Gold Medal. In June 2020, NASA renamed its DC headquarters after Jackson to The Mary W. Jackson NASA Headquarters.





Ruth E. Carter is an American costume designer for film and television, with over 40 films to her credit, who has mastered the look of multiple periods and genres in envisioning the clothing and overall appearance of a character or performer. Carter's unparalleled ability to develop an authentic story through costume has made her one of the most sought after and renowned costume designers to date.

During her near 30-year film career, Carter has been nominated three times for the Academy Award for Best Costume Design for her work on Spike Lee's biographical film *Malcolm X* (1992), Steven Spielberg's historical drama film *Amistad* (1997), and her most recent work on Ryan Coogler's Marvel superhero film *Black Panther* (2018), for which she won the award and became **the first African-American to win an Academy Award for Best Costume Design**. That win was also the first Academy Award win for Marvel Studios.

Carter graduated from **Hampton Institute**, currently known as Hampton University in 1982 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree. Carter began her career working as an intern in her hometown of Springfield, Massachusetts and at the *Santa Fe Opera*. She moved to Los Angeles in 1986. While working at the Los Angeles Theater Center, Carter met director Spike Lee, who hired her for his second film, *School Daze* (1988), and with whom she worked on a number of films thereafter, including *Do the Right Thing* (1989), *Mo' Better Blues* (1990), *Jungle Fever* (1991), and *Malcolm X* (1992). Carter has continued to work on films for Spike Lee, including *Oldboy* (2013), *Da Sweet Blood of Jesus* (2014), and *Chi-Raq* (2015).

Carter is also known for her work on What's Love Got to Do with It (1993), Serenity (2005), Four Brothers (2005), Sparkle (2012), The Butler (2013) directed by Lee Daniels, and Selma (2014) directed by Ava DuVernay. Carter's most recent work was on the Afrofuturist superhero Marvel Cinematic Universe Film Black Panther (2018), directed by Ryan Coogler. Her costumes were inspired by many traditional African garments, including those of the Maasai and Ndebele people. She traveled to southern Africa to draw aesthetic inspirations and received permission to incorporate traditional Lesotho designs into the film's costumes. <u>Find out more about Ruth E. She is the first Black woman and first nurse to represent Missouri; the first woman to represent Missouri's 1st Congressional District; and the first activist from the movement fighting for Black lives elected to the United States Congress.

Born and raised in St. Louis, Congresswoman Bush graduated from Cardinal Ritter College Prep High School and studied at **Harris-Stowe State University** before receiving a nursing degree from the Lutheran School of Nursing. She has served her community for more than a decade as a nurse, clergy, and childcare worker. A relentless advocate for the unhoused community in St. Louis, **Congresswoman Bush** has spent years as a community organizer providing services and aid to her unhoused neighbors in the district. Congresswoman Bush is the recipient of the 2015 "*Woman of Courage*" *Award* from the Emmett Till Legacy Foundation. In May of 2019, she received the *Herschel Walker Award* at the 27th Annual Herschel Walker "Peace & Justice" Awards. In June of 2019, she was selected *Top Nurse* by the International Nurses Association. In October of 2020, the Jefferson City NAACP awarded Congresswoman Bush their prestigious "*Trailblazer Award*."



Chadwick Aaron Boseman

Chadwick Aaron Boseman was born on November 29, 1977 in Anderson, South Carolina. His parents were Carolyn and Leroy Boseman. His father worked in the textile industry and ran an upholstery business while his mother worked as a nurse. Chadwick Boseman attended T. L. Hanna High School and then graduated from **Howard University in 2000 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree in Directing**. He then attended London's British American Drama Academy. After Boseman returned to the US, he enrolled at New York City's Digital Film Academy. After completing his studies, he began his acting career by doing a number of TV programs. Soon, he ventured into films as well. At the start of his career, he worked as a drama instructor at the Schomburg Center for Research in New York.

Chadwick Boseman started acting in 2003 when he secured a recurring role in the TV series *All My Children*. After this, he appeared in an episode each of *Third Watch*, *Law & Order* and *CSI: NY* respectively. In 2008, he was cast as Nathaniel "Nate" Ray in the series *Lincoln Heights*. The same year, the actor did the flick *The Express*. Next, he played Sergeant McNair in the series *Persons Unknown*. In 2011, he was featured in the TV programs *Castle*, *Fringe*, *Detroit* and *Justified* respectively.

Chadwick Boseman was best known for playing **Jackie Robinson** in the biographical sports movie, *42*, in 2013. He then played **James Brown** in the 2014 biographical film *Get on Up*. Then in 2016, the American artiste was featured in the flick *Gods of Egypt*. That year, he also joined the cast of *Captain America: Civil War* as T'Challa / Black Panther. After this, Boseman co-produced as well as acted in the flick *Marshall*. In the year 2018, he reprised his role as T'Challa / Black Panther in the movies *Black Panther* and *Avengers: Infinity War* respectively. In 2019, he starred in the action thriller film *21 Bridges*. The last film of his career was the war-drama, film *Da 5 Bloods* which was released on Netflix on 12 June 2020. Chadwick Boseman died on August 28, 2020, in Los Angeles, California, following a four-year battle with colon cancer. **Chadwick Aaron Boseman** was 43 years young.

Huston-Tillotson College was formed by the merger of **Samuel Huston College** and **Tillotson College**, which was effective on October 24, 1952. Huston-Tillotson College remained primarily a black college after the merger, although there were no restrictions as to race. Over time, **HT** nurtured a legacy of leadership and excellence in education, connecting knowledge, power, passion, and values. Larry L. Earvin became the fifth president of the University in 2000 and moved the institution to university status.

Huston-Tillotson University awards undergraduates four-year degrees in business, education, the humanities, natural sciences, social sciences, science and technology. In **HT's** programs, courses are offered in a format designed specifically for working adults. In order to accommodate students' busy schedules, classes are offered twice a week. **HT's** one-time registration process is completed at the beginning of the student's program.

The Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) was chartered in 1958 through the mutual efforts of four seminaries that came together to form one school of theology, in cooperation as an ecumenical cluster. The collaborative later added two additional schools and today houses five seminaries and an ecumenical fellowship. **ITC** is the world's only graduate theology program with this unique model that is exclusively African American but inclusive to all:

- The Baptist-affiliated Morehouse School of Religion
- The United Methodist-affiliated Gammon Theological Seminary
- Turner Theological Seminary (African Methodist Episcopal)
- Phillips School of Theology (Christian Methodist Episcopal)

ITC is the largest free-standing African American theological school in the United States. In their 1990 book, *The Black Church in the African American Experience*, C. Eric Lincoln and Lawrence H. Mamiya identified the **ITC** as one of several black ecumenical initiatives that *arose in the United States in connection with the civil rights and black consciousness movements*. They called the **ITC** "one of the more successful ventures in black ecumenism." In their 2007 book, *The Future of Pentecostalism in the United States*, Eric Patterson and Edmund John Rybarczyk described the **ITC** as "a *major center of progressive, African American theological thought.*"

It is one of the largest HBCUs in the United States and the fourth largest university in Mississippi. The mission of Jackson State University is to provide quality teaching, research and service at the baccalaureate, master's, specialist, and doctoral levels to diverse populations of students and communities using various modalities to ensure that they are technologically advanced, ethical, global leaders who think critically and can address societal problems and compete effectively.

Jackson State University is a diverse technologically-advanced four-year university steeped in history and committed to preparing its students to become global leaders. Jackson State provides a caring, nurturing environment in which to challenge its students to improve themselves and serve others. The University offers 45 undergraduate programs, 48 graduate programs and 19 online programs.



Walter Payton began his football career in Mississippi and went on to have an outstanding collegiate football career at **Jackson State University** where he was an All-American. He started his professional career with the Chicago Bears in 1975 and proceeded to win the 1977 AP NFL Most Valuable Player Award and won Super Bowl XX with the 1995 Chicago Bears. He was regarded as one of the best football players of all time.

Walter was a nine-time Pro Bowl selectee and was elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1993, the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame that same year, and the College Football Hall of Fame in 1996. He was named to the NFL 75th Anniversary All-Time Team in 1994, and the NFL 100th Anniversary All-Time Team in 2019. Hall of Fame NFL player and coach Mike Ditka described Payton as the greatest football player he had ever seen—but even greater as a human being. He retired from football at the end of the 1987 season having rushed for at least 1,200 yards in 10 of his 13 seasons in the NFL.

Dr. Felesia Stukes is becoming a trailblazer in the world of data science, especially for women, minorities and HBCUs. In January 2021, Stukes was awarded the IBM Academic Award for Social Computing Command Center: Innovating Undergraduate Data Science Curriculum. The IBM Academic Award program fosters collaboration between researchers at leading universities and IBM Researchers and Technologists worldwide. The partnership includes Watson IBM, a question-answering computer system, for the campus to use. **Stukes**, who developed and leads the data science minor at **Johnson C. Smith University**, hopes this partnership helps her fulfill her long-term goal of diversifying the data science industry.

Dr. Stukes is a **North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University** graduate and the **first Black faculty member in the Department of Computer Science at JCSU**. **Dr. Stukes** has expanded her efforts more broadly outside of **JCSU**. She is currently collaborating with five other HBCUs in a data science consortium, designed to inspire and extend a culture of academic development and research collaborations across the region, state, and ultimately, the nation. Fred "Curly" Neal

Fred "Curly" Neal was a basketball legend for the **world-famous Harlem Globetrotters** and became a global icon while representing the sport around the world. During his 22-year career with the Harlem Globetrotters, Neal played more than 6,000 basketball games in 97 countries. He adopted the nickname "Curly" because of his iconic bald head and warm personality that won over the hearts of many basketball fans. While Neal's basketball skills elevated him to celebrity status, his ability to make people smile is what defined the former basketball legend.

Neal's love for basketball began early and lasted throughout his life. Born and raised in Greensboro, North Carolina, he attended Greensboro-Dudley High School where he became a highly regarded player. From 1959 to 1963 Neal played college basketball at **Johnson C. Smith University**. Here he averaged 23.1 points per game. Toward the end of his collegiate career Neal led his team to CIAA championship. Immediately following graduation, he joined the world-famous **Harlem Globetrotters**. One of his first actions was to shave his head. This bold move earned him the nickname "Curly" referencing the classic "Three Stooges" character. In 1985, Fred "Curly" Neal retired from the **Harlem Globetrotters**. Neal served as the *Director of Special Projects* for the *Orlando Magic*, worked in *Public Relations* for the *Harlem Globetrotters*, and operated as *Spokesperson* for *Siemens Corporation*. In the 1991-1992 basketball season, Neal invested and starred in the NBA's "Stay in School" initiative encouraging middle school students to avoid drugs. His work with the "Stay in School" program influenced over 50,000 students in Central Florida.

On February 15, 2008, Curly Neal's iconic jersey number 22 was retired to the rafters of Madison Square Garden. He became only the fifth Globetrotter ever to have his jersey retired joining **Wilt Chamberlain**, **Marques Haynes**, **Meadowlark Lemon**, and **Goose Tatum**. In the same year, Neal was also inducted into the **North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame** alongside legendary coach **Roy Williams**. On March 26, 2020 Fred "Curly" Neal died at the age of 77. His legacy with the Globetrotters was honored as a recipient of the "Legends" ring. Recipients of the Globetrotters' "Legends" ring have made major impacts in the Globetrotters organization while also making significant humanitarian efforts. His legacy is a life characterized by incredible basketball abilities and a lifelong effort to help others and bring the world joy.

On November 3, 1970, in Syracuse, NY, **Jeanette J. Epps** was born to parents Henry and Luberta Epps. She was born, with her twin sister, Janet, as the youngest of seven with two other sisters and three brothers. Epps graduated from Thomas J. Corcoran High School in Syracuse in 1988. She attended **LeMoyne-Owen College** and graduated in 1992 with a Bachelor of Science in Physics. She then received her Master of Science in 1994 and Doctorate of Philosophy in Aerospace Engineering in 2000, both at the University of Maryland.

In 2003, **Epps** joined the CIA in Iraq for four months as a Technical Operations Officer, where she looked for weapons of mass destruction. She worked with the CIA for a total of seven and a half years as an analyst of foreign weapons systems. She then entered the agency's Directorate of Science and Technology, developing operations that allow the collection of technology-related intelligence data for the US government. Throughout the years, **Epps** continually followed NASA's program in selecting new astronauts but worried about not being picked. Putting aside her fear, **Epps** applied to the program and on June 23, 2009, she received a call confirming she was selected for NASA's next group of astronauts. After Astronaut Candidate Training, **Epps** participated in NEEMO (NASA Extreme Environment Mission Operation), studied geology in Hawaii and immersed herself in the Russian language in Moscow, Russia. She also continued spacewalk training (EVA), robotics and T-38. She worked on crew efficiency on the space station as a representative to the Generic Joint Operation Panel, as well as other topics. **Epps** also worked as a *Crew Support Astronaut for two expeditions and as lead CAPCOM (Capsule Communicator*) in mission control.



John Morton-Finney

John Morton-Finney was a true Renaissance man, earning an impressive **11 degrees** during his lifetime. The former *Buffalo Soldier Army* man and educator is also considered by some historians as **the longest-serving lawyer of all time**. Morton-Finney was born to a former slave father and a free mother in Kentucky. The parents taught their seven children the value of education which served the young man well early on. He joined the U.S. Army and became a member of the 24th Infantry Regiment, better known as the **Buffalo Soldiers**. Morton-Finney fought twice, first in the Philippines and once more in World War I.

Honorably discharged after his first tour, **Morton-Finney** earned the first of his degrees from **Lincoln College** in Missouri. When the great war began, he donned the uniform once more and fought for the American Expeditionary Force in France. **Morton-Finney** was teaching at a one-room schoolhouse at that time, and he returned to the States and earned several degrees in math, French, and history. **Morton-Finney** taught languages at **Fisk University** in Tennessee and at **Lincoln University** in Missouri, before moving to Indianapolis, Indiana, where he taught in the Indianapolis Public Schools for 47 years.

Morton-Finney met and fell in love with **Lincoln College** teacher Pauline Ray after taking her class. The pair wed in 1922 and relocated to Indianapolis, where **Morton-Finney** taught at the all-Black Crispus Attucks High School. **Morton-Finney** was head of the school's foreign language departments and was responsible for encouraging several children to pursue higher education.

While teaching at Crispus Attucks in 1935, **Morton-Finney** earned the first of four law degrees. He was also a voracious reader, often reading three or four titles at a time, according to accounts. In an interview on his 100th birthday, he said that he believed that there was no end to learning. At 75, **Morton-Finney** earned the last of his several degrees from Butler University. **He practiced law until he was 107 years old.**







Langston Hughes

James Mercer Langston Hughes was born February 1, 1902 in Joplin, Missouri. Hughes, an American writer critical to the *Harlem Renaissance*, portrayed the African American experience in the subject of his writings. While it was long believed that **Hughes** was born in 1902, new research released in 2018 indicated that he might have been born the previous year. His parents separated soon after his birth, and he was raised by his mother and grandmother. After his grandmother's death, he and his mother moved to half a dozen cities before reaching Cleveland, where they settled. He wrote the poem "The Negro Speaks of Rivers" the summer after his graduation from high school in Cleveland; it was published in *The Crisis* in 1921 and brought him considerable attention.

While working as a busboy in a hotel in Washington, D.C., in late 1925, **Hughes** put three of his own poems beside the plate of Vachel Lindsay in the dining room. The next day, newspapers around the country reported that Lindsay, among the most popular white poets of the day, had "discovered" an African American busboy poet, which earned **Hughes** broader notice. **Hughes** received a scholarship to, and began attending, **Lincoln University in Pennsylvania** in early 1926.

By the time **Hughes** received his degree in 1929, he had helped launch the influential magazine "Fire!!" in 1926, and he had also published a second collection of poetry, Fine Clothes to the Jew (1927), which was criticized by some for its title and for its frankness, though **Hughes** himself felt that it represented another step forward in his writing. A few months after **Hughes's** graduation, Not Without Laughter (1930), his first prose volume, had a cordial reception.

He also wrote poetry until his death; The Panther and the Lash, published posthumously in 1967, reflected and engaged with the **Black Power Movement** and, specifically, the **Black Panther Party**, which was founded the previous year.



Thurgood Marshall

Thurgood Marshall, originally Thoroughgood Marshall, was a lawyer, civil rights activist, and associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court (1967–91); the Court's first African American member. As an attorney, he successfully argued before the Court the case of Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka (1954), which declared unconstitutional racial segregation in American public schools.

Marshall was the son of William Canfield Marshall, a railroad porter and a steward at an all-white country club, and Norma Williams Marshall, an elementary school teacher. He graduated with honors from **Lincoln University (Pennsylvania)** in 1930. After being rejected by the University of Maryland Law School because he was not white, **Marshall attended Howard University Law School**. He received his degree in 1933, ranking first in his class. At **Howard University**, he was the protégé of Charles Hamilton Houston, who encouraged Marshall and other law students to view the law as a vehicle for social change.

Upon his graduation from **Howard University**, **Marshall** began the private practice of law in Baltimore. Among his first legal victories was Murray v. Pearson (1935), a suit accusing the University of Maryland of violating the Fourteenth Amendment's guarantee of equal protection of the laws by denying an African American applicant admission to its law school solely on the basis of race. In 1936, **Marshall** became a staff lawyer under Houston for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); in 1938, he became the lead chair in the legal office of the NAACP, and two years later he was named chief of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund.

Throughout the 1940s and '50s, **Marshall** distinguished himself as one of the country's top lawyers, winning 29 of the 32 cases that he argued before the Supreme Court. Without a doubt, however, it was **Marshall's** victory before the Supreme Court in Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka that established his reputation as a formidable and creative legal opponent and an advocate of social change. Indeed, students of constitutional law still examine the oral arguments of the case and the ultimate decision of the Court from both a legal and a political perspective; legally, **Marshall** argued that segregation in public education produced unequal schools for African Americans and whites (a key element in the strategy to have the Court overrule the "separate but equal" doctrine established in Plessy v. Ferguson [1896]), but it was **Marshall's** reliance on psychological, sociological, and historical data that presumably sensitized the Court to the deleterious effects of institutionalized segregation on the self-image, social worth, and social progress of African American children.

Founded in 1876 as the Medical Department of Central Tennessee College, it was the first medical school for African Americans in the South. Currently, the school has an enrollment of over 800 students and has become the largest private HBCU in the United States solely dedicated to educating health care professionals and scientists of color.

Meharry Medical College offers a wide array of degrees from its School of Medicine, School of Dentistry, School of Allied Health Professions, and the School of Graduate Studies and Research. **Meharry** is the second-largest educator of African American medical doctors and dentists in the United States and has the highest percentage of African Americans graduating with Ph.Ds. in the biomedical sciences in the country. Meharry boasts an alumni base who've done great things for medicine, science, and equality and equity in healthcare for the African American community.



Dr. Robert Agee is a board-certified family practice physician who is fellowship trained in sports medicine. **Dr. Agee** earned his bachelor's degree from **Morehouse College** and went on to complete his medical degree at **Meharry Medical College**. He finished his family practice residency at UCSF Fresno and his sports medicine fellowship at the American Sports Medicine Institute in Birmingham, AL. During his career, **Dr. Agee** has served in clinical leadership roles as Chief of Primary Care / Sports Medicine, Medical Director, and Fellowship Director. **Dr. Agee** has more than 10 years of experience caring for elite athletes from the NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and the NFL European League. Under the leadership of Birmingham, AL Mayor-and **Morehouse College** graduate-**Randall Woodfin**, **Dr. Agee** has also been the past Medical Director for the legendary sports stadium, Legion Field. <u>Click here to learn more!</u>







Third-year medical student Mekdes "Duni" Getaneh is a founding member of a national organization helping to bring comfort and healing to people with Alzheimer's. Getaneh is a board member of Alzheimer's Buddies, a national organization that pairs college students with people living in nursing homes who have been diagnosed with dementia for weekly one-on-one visits. She is using her platform to bring awareness to the unique challenges African Americans with dementia face. Studies show improvements in the health of patients who have regular contact with people whom they make a connection with. To account for this, Getaneh wants to recruit more African American students to take part in the program and hopes to inspire a new generation of caregivers and clinicians.

"I would like to have students of color doing more visits," **Getaneh** said. "If someone who looks like you visits you, it then makes a difference in lowering the social isolation and disengagement that often comes along with the diagnosis of AD." Alzheimer's Buddies was founded at Harvard College and today has 14 undergraduate chapters, including an undergraduate chapter at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. **Getaneh** said her hope is to expand the effort to HBCUs such as **Fisk University** and **Tennessee State University**. She would also like for graduate students at health science centers like Meharry to form Alzheimer's Buddies chapters.

With 5.4 million Americans living with Alzheimer's disease, battling profound isolation and social disengagement, Alzheimer's Buddies seeks to alleviate the often-overlooked emotional and social challenges that stem from Alzheimer's by building friendships between college students and Alzheimer's residents. In addition to weekly visits, volunteers with Alzheimer's Buddies write letters to the families of their buddies, highlighting the positive aspects of their weekly visits, suggesting activities families can do together, and helping reconnect family members with their loved ones. Nursing home residents participating in the program are reported to show a decrease in depression and increased participation in social activities outside of Alzheimer's Buddies visits.

Getaneh first became involved in the organization when she was referred to Alzheimer's Buddies after volunteering for another program as an undergraduate student at Gordon College. **Getaneh** was assigned to spend time with a woman with Parkinson's. Word of her connection with the Parkinson's patient made it to students at Harvard College who invited **Getaneh** to join them in launching Alzheimer's Buddies.

"Her life was so transformed and all we did was try on dresses or read a newspaper or watch Netflix," **Getaneh** said of her experience with the patient with Parkinson's. "I learned that I can make all of the difference." **Getaneh** continued to foster her interest in helping dementia patients through her international research. She studied approximately 25,000 people enrolled in a project in the UK to try to understand if depression and anxiety play a role in accelerating cognitive decline in older adults. <u>Click here for more!</u>

Jerry Rice was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers in 1985, and after an initially sluggish start, he became one of the cornerstones of the SF 49ers team and played in several winning Super Bowl's, pairing brilliantly with legendary San Francisco 49er guarterback's Joe Montana and Steve Young. After fifteen years with the San Francisco 49ers, Rice was traded to the Oakland Raiders, and even at 39 years of age he was still capable of setting records and out running opposition players. The finest wide receiver in the history of NFL football, bar none. The incredibly athletic Rice has scored the most touchdowns in NFL history, plus he holds virtually every career record for receptions, yards receiving, all-purpose yards, touchdown receptions and yards from scrimmage, and most consecutive games with at least one catch! A former American football wide receiver, he played a total of 20 seasons in his active playing time and went on to become the greatest wide receiver in NFL history. Nicknamed "The G.O.A.T.," he is an all-time NFL leader in receptions, touchdown receptions, and yards. His career record stands at 1,549 receptions for 22,895 yards with 197 touchdown receptions and 208 total receptions. Rice finished his career with 1295 points, which makes him the highest scoring non-kicker in NFL history.





In 1975, André became an assistant at the Costume Institute of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, where he met Diana Vreeland. Subsequently, she became his mentor and a good friend. The same year, she introduced André Leon Talley to Andy Warhol for a position as a secretary at Warhol's Interview magazine for \$50 per week. After some time, Andy Warhol offered André Leon Talley an opportunity to write articles for the same magazine. As a writer, André made acquaintances with Karl Lagerfeld, Jacqueline Kennedy, and her younger sister Caroline Lee Radziwill. He also worked for The New York Times and other publications before finally landing at Vogue, where he worked as the Fashion News Director from 1983 to 1987 and then as Creative Director from 1988 to 1995. Talley pushed top designers to have more African-American models in their shows. Currently, Talley has been a front-row regular at fashion shows in New York, Paris, London and Milan for more than 25 years.

His music is not only popular in the USA, but in his motherland Nigeria as well. Adeleke studied Business Administration at Oakwood University before pursuing his music career. Davido rose to fame after releasing "Dami Duro", the second single from his debut studio album Omo Baba Olowo (2012). In January 2016, Davido signed a record deal with Sony Music and a few months later founded the record label Davido Music Worldwide (DMW). In July 2016, Davido signed a record deal with Sony's RCA Records. In October 2016, he released the 5-track EP Son of Mercy, which was supported by the singles "Gbagbe Oshi," "How Long" and "Coolest Kid in Africa." In April 2017, Davido re-negotiated his contract with Sony due to creative control issues and later that year he released five singles including "If" and "Fall." "If" generated worldwide social media activity while "Fall" became the longest-charting Nigerian pop song in Billboard history. Davido released his second studio album A Good Time in November 2019 and was cited as one of the Top 100 most influential Africans by New African magazine in 2019. Davido released his third studio album A Better Time, in 2020. In February 2021, Time Magazine named him on their Time100 Next list! In more recent news, Davido is currently making music with nationalrecording artist Drake!

Paine College is located in the heart of Augusta, Georgia. John Wesley Gilbert was an educator, a missionary, the first African American archaeologist and the first graduate of Paine College. Gilbert was born free on July 6, 1863 in Hephzibah, Georgia, to Gabriel and Sarah, farm hands born into slavery. In his youth, Gilbert attended the local public schools while working as a farm hand. He first enrolled into Augusta Institute in 1878 and remained there for two years, before he began teaching at Ware High School, Richmond, Georgia, in 1880. He remained there until 1883. Gilbert then enrolled at the new Paine College in Augusta, becoming the institution's first student. He attended from 1884 to 1886 and studied Greek and other foreign languages. He then transferred to the junior class of Brown University, in Rhode Island. Later in 1888 Gilbert moved back to Georgia and began to court Osceola K. Pleasant, a teacher and graduate of Paine College and Fisk University. While attending Brown University, Gilbert received a scholarship to attend the American School of Classics, in Athens, Greece. He traveled there to begin his studies in 1890. He was the first African American to attend the school and participated in archaeological fieldwork during his year of attendance. During one of those excavations, Gilbert found walls, gates, and pillars that led to the discovery of the ancient Greek city of Eretria. Due to his discoveries, he created the first map of the area. When Gilbert returned to Brown in 1891, he focused his studies on archaeology, and became the first African American to receive an advanced degree from the institution, earning his master's degree in Archaeology in 1891. Professor Gilbert returned to Augusta and began teaching Greek, Latin, English, French, German, and Hebrew at Paine College in the fall of 1891. He was the first African American instructor at the school. In 1913, Dr. Gilbert was appointed President of Miles College in Fairfield, Alabama. He remained in that position for one year, before he returned to teaching Greek, Hebrew, and New Testament literature, and to serve as the Dean of the Divinity School at Paine College, a position he held until his retirement in 1920.



Paul Quinn College, one of the most innovative small colleges in America, is a private, faith-based, four-year, liberal artsinspired college that was founded on April 4, 1872 by a group of African Methodist Episcopal Church preachers in Austin, Texas. Using the model established by **Tuskegee Institute**, classes were held in a modest one-building trade school.

Today, Paul Quinn has become a model for urban higher education by focusing on academic rigor, experiential learning, and entrepreneurship. As one of few HBCUs that boasts a fully functional community farm on its campus through a groundbreaking partnership with PepsiCo to convert an unused football stadium into a fully operational urban farm, Paul Quinn's students are invested and encouraged to take part in peaceful social activism.

Beginning in the Fall of 2015, Paul Quinn College adopted a new student financial structure called the "New Urban College Model" which, among other characteristics, reduced student tuition and fees and provides students with the ability to graduate with less than \$10,000 of student loan debt. There are currently eight work colleges in the nation. Paul Quinn is the ninth federally funded work college in the United States, the first Minority Serving Institution ("MSI") in the Work **College Consortium**, and the first work college in Texas.

Born in the Roseland neighborhood of Chicago, **Cole** graduated from Thornridge High School and progressed on to **Philander Smith College. Cole** started in comedy when a friend bet him \$50 that he would not get up on stage one night in Chicago. Since his humble beginnings, Cole has progressed into a Comedic Rockstar! He wrote for Conan's shows *The Tonight Show with Conan O'Brien* (from 2009 to 2010) and *Conan* (from 2010 to 2012). In February 2010, **Cole** performed on "*Comic Aide Haiti*", a comedy performance that benefited victims of the 2010 Haiti earthquake. Cole has performed stand up on other programs such as *John Oliver's New York Stand-Up Show, Mash Up* and *Lopez Tonight*. **Deon Cole** made a breakthrough with his role as *Charlie Telphy* in the **ABC sitcom Black-ish** and won multiple awards for his role. He has also appeared on the shows *Angie Tribeca* and **Grown-ish**. In 2019, he was featured in the Netflix special *Deon Cole: Cole Hearted*. He has been seen in films such as the *Barbershop series* and *Holiday Rush*. In 2020, he released a video titled *40 Minutes of Deon Cole "Workin' It Out"* on YouTube, which contained clippings of his practice sessions for his 2020 comedy.





Dr. Joycelyn Elders

Medical doctor and professor **Dr. Joycelyn Elders** was born on August 14, 1933 in Schaal, Arkansas to Curtis Jones and Haller Reed Jones. **Elders** was the first of eight children in a family of sharecroppers. **Elders** attended Howard County Training School in Tollette, Arkansas in 1942. She earned a four-year scholarship to attend **Philander Smith College** in Little Rock, Arkansas where she received her B.S. degree in biology and where she also pledged *Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.* In 1960, **Elders** earned her M.D. degree and her M.S. degree in biochemistry in 1967 from the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences in Little Rock, Arkansas. In 1978, **Elders** earned her certification as a pediatric endocrinologist.

After she earned her M.D. degree, **Elders** began a pediatric internship at the University of Minnesota in St. Paul, Minnesota. She became the chief resident at the University of Arkansas Medical School in 1963. **Elders** was hired as an assistant professor at the University of Arkansas in 1971 and was promoted to the position of professor in 1976. In 1987, Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton appointed **Elders** as director of the Arkansas Department of Health. She then became the 15th Surgeon General of the United States under President Clinton in January 1993. Bill Clinton appointed her as the **United States Surgeon** General, making her **the first African American** and the second woman to hold the position. As *Surgeon General*, **Elders** focused on women's reproductive health care and promoted sex, alcohol, drug, and tobacco education in public schools. She resigned from that position in 1994 and returned to the University of Arkansas, where she worked as a professor of pediatric endocrinology. In 2002, **Elders** retired from the University of Arkansas Medical Center. In 2016, the *Jocelyn Elders Clinic* was established in Kisinga, Uganda. The clinic served students at Garama Humanist Secondary School and promoted sex education and treated students that suffered from diseases such as malaria.

During her career, **Elders** published over one hundred academic papers that related to insulin resistance and other endocrine disorders. In 1997, she published her memoir, *From Sharecroppers' Daughter to Surgeon General of the United States of America*. **Elders** was the recipient of the *Woman of Distinction Award* from Worthen Bank in 1987, the *Arkansas Democrat Woman of the Year* from Statewide Newspaper in 1998, and the *Candace Award* from the *National Coalition of 100 Black Women* in 1991. She was inducted into the *Arkansas Women's Hall of Fame* in 2016. **Elders** also received the *Career Development Award* from the National Institute of Health. In 2009, *The Joycelyn Elders Chair in Sexual Health Education* was established at the University of Minnesota Medical School. In 1992, **Elders** was elected president of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers. *Elders strongly advocated sex and reproductive education, especially in African-American communities*. She criticized older textbooks that said only white females had naturally regular periods because white females were on birth control to regulate their periods. Black females did not readily seek out birth control because their "ministers were up on the pulpit saying the birth control pills were black genocide." She was very vocal about her disgust with black men exploiting black women and stripping them of their reproductive health choices, because "*If you can't control your reproduction, you can't control your life*".

Ida B. Wells-Barnett

Ida B. Wells-Barnett, was a journalist, a civil rights activist and a suffragist. She also was a wife, mother and elder whose matriarchal influence on her family remains strong and intact. Ida B. Wells was born into slavery on July 16, 1862 in Holly Springs, Mississippi as the oldest of eight children. Her father, James, was a carpenter and her mother, Elizabeth, was a famous cook. Once slavery ended, Ida attended **Shaw University (now Rust College)** along with her mother who attended school long enough to learn how to read the Bible. She grew up surrounded by political activists during Reconstruction with a sense of hope about the possibilities of former slaves within the American society. She soon became a teacher in a rural Mississippi school order to earn money for the family. After two years, she moved to Memphis for a higher paying teaching job.

Although she wrote for church newspapers about inequality in schools as well as many other areas of life, one day changed her life forever. She was accustomed to riding the train in whatever seat she chose. In 1884, the Chesapeake, Ohio and Southwest Railroad forbade her from sitting in the ladies' coach, even though she had a ticket. She was forcibly removed by three men because she refused to move to the colored car. She subsequently decided to sue the railroad and also wrote an article about the experience. The success of her article about the case as well as the uproar caused by her criticism of the school systems, influenced her career change from teacher to journalist. Wells was invited to Chicago by **Frederick Douglass** in 1893 to work on the pamphlet that was distributed at the World's Fair to explain the lack of African American representation.

In 1895 she settled in Chicago when she married Ferdinand L. Barnett, a widower and a fellow crusader who was a well-known attorney as well as the founder of 'The Conservator' Newspaper. Barnett had two children from his previous marriage, the couple had four children of their own in eight years. She also was very active in the women's suffrage movement, starting the all-black **Alpha Suffrage Club** in **1913**. She was awarded a posthumous *2020 Pulitzer Prize Special Citation* for her outstanding and courageous reporting on the horrific and vicious violence against African Americans during the era of lynching.

In 1989, he was Co-SIAC Player of the Year, selected to the Kodak Small College All-America First Team, and named the College Player of the Year in Georgia. He was the first Savannah State player to play in the Blue-Gray Classic (1990) and East-West Shrine Game (1990). Sharpe owns SSU single season receiving records for yardage, touchdowns, and yards per catch. His #2 football jersey was officially retired on Shannon Sharpe Day in October 2009 at SSU. Sharpe received his B.S. degree in criminal justice in 1990.

Shannon Sharpe was drafted in the seventh round of the 1990 National Football League Draft by the Denver Broncos. He went on to play professional football for 12 seasons and the Baltimore Ravens for two years. **Sharpe** was inducted into the *Pro Football Hall of Fame* on August 6, 2011. He won *three Super Bowls* and finished his career as the *NFL's all-time leader in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns by a tight end*. **Sharpe** was *the first tight end to amass over 10,000 receiving yards* and was named to the first team of the *NFL 1990s All-Decade Team*. **Shannon** is a former analyst for CBS Sports on its NFL telecasts. He is widely regarded as one of the *greatest Tight Ends of all time*. He is a successful sports analyst with the YouTube dominant series of "*Undisputed*".



Spelman is proud of its 76% graduation rate (average over six years), one of the best in the nation, but the support doesn't stop once women step on stage to take their diplomas. Spelman's global alumnae network is strong, providing connections and helping hands to graduates as they begin on their path of global engagement. **Spelman College** is dedicated to academic excellence in the liberal arts and sciences and the intellectual, creative, ethical, and leadership development of its students. Through diverse learning modalities, **Spelman** empowers the whole person to engage the many cultures of the world and inspires a commitment to positive social change.



Born in Newark, New Jersey, **Keisha Knight Pulliam** started her career by appearing in commercials when she was only a baby. In 1984, **Pulliam** got the biggest break of her career. She was only four years old when she landed the role of Bill Cosby's adorable and witty daughter Rudy Huxtable on *The Cosby Show*. From the outset, **Pulliam** received rave reviews for her performance on screen and her maturity on set. When *The Cosby Show* ended its run in 1992, her family moved to Virginia, where **Knight Pulliam** attended the Potomac School in McLean and Foxcroft School in Middleburg, Virginia, from which she graduated in 1997. **Pulliam** also attended **Spelman College**, where she became a member of the **Eta Kappa Chapter** of **Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. Pulliam** graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology in 2001. She has also worked on several TV and film projects, including *Madea Goes to Jail* and *House of Payne*.



Politician, lawyer, author and activist **Stacey Abrams** graduated as the *first Black Valedictorian* from Avondale High School in DeKalb County, Georgia, before earning a Magna Cum Laude undergraduate degree in interdisciplinary studies (political science, economics and sociology) with a minor in theater from **Spelman College**. She later graduated from the LBJ School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas at Austin with a Master of Public Affairs in public policy and received her J.D. from Yale Law School.

In 2006, **Abrams** was elected as a *Georgia State Representative*, and within four years, she became the *House Minority Leader*. After ascending to the highest state legislative role in 2010, **Abrams** earned the distinction of becoming *the first woman to lead either party in the Georgia General Assembly*, as well as the *first African American to lead in the House of Representatives*. During her 11 years in the Georgia House (seven as Democratic leader), **Abrams** served on the Appropriations, Ethics, Judiciary Non-Civil, Rules, and Ways & Means committees. As Georgia's then-top-ranking Democrat, she traveled to and met with leaders in South Korea, Israel and Taiwan, and her international policy travel included Australia, Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Canada, France, Israel, Italy, the Netherlands, South Korea, Switzerland, Taiwan and the United Kingdom. After leaving her state representative position, **Abrams** launched a 2018 run for *Governor of Georgia*, becoming *the first Black woman to earn a major party's gubernatorial nomination in the United States*. Despite winning more votes than any Democratic candidate in the state's history (including former President Barack Obama), she lost to Georgia Secretary of State Brian Kemp by fewer than two percentage points and just over 50,000 votes of the more than four million cast.

Following her election loss, **Abrams**, in 2018, founded **Fair Fight**, a voter protection and education organization, which aims to "promote fair elections in Georgia and around the country, encourage voter participation in elections, and educate voters about elections and their voting rights." **Through her efforts**, **she helped register at least 800,000 new voters in Georgia ahead of the 2020 general election**, **per National Public Radio (NPR)**, and as a result, Democrat Joe Biden won the state's electoral votes for President in 2020. As an additional beneficial consequence to <u>Stacy Abrams' efforts</u>, Democrats Reverend Raphael Warnock and Jon Osoff also flipped Georgia's two Republican-held Senate seats in a January 2021 special run-off race. In addition to her political career, she's also published eight romantic suspense novels under the pen name *Selena Montgomery*.



Wilma Rudolph

Wilma Rudolph, an American sprinter, was the first American-born woman ever to win three track-and-field gold medals in a single Olympics. Rudolph was born prematurely on June 23, 1940, in St. Bethlehem, Tennessee, the 20th of 22 children born to dad Ed across his two marriages. She went on to become a pioneering African American track and field champion, but the road to victory was not an easy one for Rudolph. Stricken with double pneumonia, scarlet fever and polio as a child, she had problems with her left leg and had to wear a brace. It was with great determination and the help of physical therapy that she was able to overcome her disabilities. She attended Tennessee State University from 1957 to 1961, where she became a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

Growing up in the segregated South, **Rudolph** attended the all-Black Burt High School, where she played on the basketball team. Nicknamed "Skeeter" for her famous speed, **Rudolph** qualified for the 1956 Summer Olympic Games in Melbourne, Australia. *The youngest member of the U.S. track and field team at age 16, she won a bronze medal in the 400-meter relay*. A naturally gifted runner, she was soon recruited to train with **Tennessee State University** track coach **Ed Temple**.

Held in Rome, Italy, the 1960 Olympic Games were a golden time for **Rudolph**. After tying a world record with her time of 11.3 seconds in the 100-meter semifinals, she won the event with her wind-aided mark of 11.0 seconds in the final. Similarly, *Rudolph broke the Olympic record in the 200-meter dash (23.2 seconds) in the heats before claiming another gold medal with her time of 24.0 seconds*. She was also part of the U.S. team that established the world record in the 400-meter relay (44.4 seconds) before going on to *win gold with a time of 44.5 seconds*. As a result, **Rudolph** became the first *American woman to win three gold medals in track and field at a single Olympic Games*. The first-class sprinter instantly became one of the most popular athletes of the Rome Games as well as an international superstar, lauded around the world for her groundbreaking achievements.

Rudolph shared her remarkable story with her 1977 autobiography, *Wilma*, which was turned into a TV film later that year. In the 1980s, she was inducted into the *U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame*. Over the years, she was inducted into *several women's and sports halls of fame*. In addition to her athletic accomplishments, **Rudolph is remembered for her contributions to youth via creating The Wilma Rudolph Foundation**. She died on November 12, 1994, in Brentwood, Tennessee, after losing a battle with brain cancer.



Oprah Gail Winfrey

Oprah began her broadcasting career at *WVOL Radio* in Nashville while still in high school. She worked there during her senior year of high school and in her first two years of college. She had won an oratory contest, which secured her a full scholarship to **Tennessee State University**, where she studied *Communication*. At the age of 19, she became *the youngest person and the first African American woman to anchor the news at Nashville's WTVF-TV*. She then relocated to Baltimore's WJZ-TV to co-anchor the "Six O'clock News" and later went on to become co-host of its local talk show, People Are Talking. In 1984, **Oprah** moved to Chicago to host WLS-TV's morning talk show, AM Chicago, which became the number one local talk show—surpassing ratings for Donahue—just one month after she began. In less than a year, the show expanded to one hour and was renamed *The Oprah Winfrey Show*. It entered *national syndication in 1986, becoming the highest-rated talk show in television history*. In 1988, she established *Harpo Studios*, making her **the third woman in the American entertainment industry** (after Mary Pickford and Lucille Ball) **to own her own studio**. Produced by **Oprah's** Harpo Studios, *The Oprah Winfrey Show* entertained, enlightened and uplifted millions of viewers for 25 years. The show reached more than 40 million viewers a week in the United States as the top-rated talk show and was licensed to 150 countries internationally.

In 2008, **Oprah** and Discovery Communications announced plans to create **OWN**: **Oprah Winfrey Network**, the first and only network named for, and inspired by, a single iconic leader. **Oprah's** heart and creative instincts inform the brand—and the magnetism of the channel. **Oprah** provides leadership in programming and attracts superstar talent to join her in primetime, building a global community of like-minded viewers and leading that community to connect on social media and beyond. **OWN** is a joint venture between *Harpo, Inc.* and Discovery Communications. The network debuted on January 1, 2011 and is available in 85 million homes. The venture also includes the award-winning digital platform *Oprah.com*. Effective July 2011, **Oprah** assumed the positions of Chairman, Chief Executive Officer and Chief Creative Officer for the network.



Dr. Oluseyi's research has focused on the development of instrumentation for space-based astronomical observation including optics, detectors, and electronics, and on the analysis of terrestrial and astronomical plasmas including semiconductor manufacturing plasmas, solar / stellar atmospheres and supernovae. He is the author or co-author of over 40 scientific publications, holds eight patents and has received several fellowships, honors and awards. As an educator, Dr. Oluseyi has taught a diversity of students from Stanford University, Foothill College, Kaplan Test Prep Center and the University of Alabama. He has supervised the research activities of 11 students, six of whom were women and seven of whom were from underrepresented minority groups. Dr. Oluseyi has also traveled regularly to South and East Africa as a member of Cosmos Education to teach K-12 students as well as to train young educators. Dr. Oluseyi is currently developing visible and near infrared CCD detectors that are designed for deployment. His recent research has focused on taking the detector program from a research mode to the delivery of precision robust reliable devices. This work has recently resulted in the deployment of the novel CCD technology as a detector in the SuperNova Intergral Field Spectrograph (SNIFS), a part of the Nearby Supernova Factory.

A strong focus of her academic interests includes humanism in medicine, medical professionalism, and patient-doctor communication skills. An avid writer, she regularly contributes reflective writing pieces to high impact journals such as *JAMA* and *The Annals of Internal Medicine and Academic Medicine*. **Dr. Manning** also mentors medical students, residents, and colleagues on writing. In addition to roles in promoting diversity and educating both pre-clinical students and residents, Manning also treats patients at Grady Memorial Hospital, one of the largest public hospitals in the United States.

In addition to the roles she plays in enhancing diversity and equity at Emory, she is also a prominent educator and is known nationally for her teaching at both the level of medical students as well as residents. She has been the recipient of numerous teaching awards including the **2012 Evangeline Papageorge Distinguished Teaching Award**–Emory University School of Medicine's highest recognition for teaching and most recently, the **2017 ACGME Courage to Teach Award**.



DoD launches aerospace center at Tuskegee University!

The U.S. Department of Defense has launched an aerospace education center of excellence at **Tuskegee University** in Alabama. **Tuskegee University** has been selected to receive a \$600,000 grant that will allow faculty in multiple departments to study aerodynamics phenomena over a three-year period.

The Department of Defense award will support research efforts by faculty in the university's Aerospace Science Engineering and Mathematics departments who are conducting cutting-edge research on the complex flow field of slender delta wings at high alpha with vectoring jets. The research team expects the project to yield an advanced understanding of how to control an aircraft by using unconventional techniques, like thrust vectoring, as well as the study of computational aerodynamics techniques.

The Aerospace Education Research and Innovation Center will support undergraduate research in materials and aerospace sciences relevant to the department and the aerospace industry, a news release said. "The establishment of centers of excellence plays a vital role in our defense enterprise by stimulating research and innovation for the next generation of STEM leaders," said Dr. Jagadeesh Pamulapati, director of the *Pentagon's Office of Research, Technology, and Laboratories*.

The school was the home of the **Tuskegee Airmen**. It is now the nation's top producer of Black aerospace engineers, the news release said. The new program will support two-year research projects in fatigue damage tolerance, experimental aerodynamics, and the performance of materials and components under extreme environmental conditions. It also will bring in defense department speakers and place summer interns at defense laboratories.

Public higher education in the District is rooted in the school for 'colored girls' that Myrtilla Miner founded in 1851 which came to be called the **Miner Normal School**. Washington Normal School, a school for white girls established in 1873, was renamed Wilson Normal School in 1913, after James O. Wilson, Washington's first superintendent of public schools. In 1929, Congress enacted a statute that converted both normal schools into four-year teacher's colleges. For several years, Miner Teachers College and Wilson Teachers College were the only institutions of public higher education in the city. After the landmark U.S. Supreme Court school desegregation decision, Brown v. Board of Education (U.S. 1954), the two colleges merged in 1955 to form the **District of Columbia Teachers College**.

The City Council authorized the consolidation of the three schools, and in 1976, began the monumental task of creating a new **University of the District of Columbia (UDC)**, the only public university in the city. Today, **UDC** offers 81 undergraduate and graduate academic degree programs through the following colleges and schools: College of Agriculture, Urban Sustainability and Environmental Sciences; College of Arts and Sciences; School of Business and Public Administration; School of Engineering and Applied Sciences, the Community College, and David A. Clarke School of Law.

Brian A. Thompson

Brian A. Thompson is a graduate of the **University of the District of Columbia (UDC)** with an Associate Degree in advertising design. **He is the first African American to design a U.S. banknote and has been employed as a Senior Journeyman Banknote Designer at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing for 31 years.** In 2013, after 10 years of intense focus, he became a nationally recognized artist as the designer of the new one-hundred-dollar banknote, commonly referred to as "The Benjamin".

Thompson's historic milestone has been featured in The Wall Street Journal, Barron's, Esquire, *Coin World*, and on *The Tom Joyner Morning Show*. In February 2021, a mural in Los Angeles was created to celebrate Black History Month and his significant achievement to our nation. **Thompson** also received **UDC's Outstanding Alumni Award in 2001**.

Thompson's artistry and inspired leadership extends into his community as well. **Thompson** served as for four years as an Assistant Pastor at Gethsemane United Methodist Church in Maryland with oversight of the youth ministry. Eventually, he was called to create his own missional ministry with his wife Pamela becoming the Founding and Senior Pastor of Easel Outreach. The mission is to build a community that develops the creative genius within everyone through the arts, heals souls with unconditional love and support, and empowers all to restore justice with dignity and respect to those who have been repressed.

Thompson's other sacred passion is being a guest lecturer on Asperger's Syndrome and mental health advocacy at K-12 schools and colleges throughout the Washington, D.C. area. **Thompson's** wealth of knowledge and experience is opening doors for many who would not otherwise have access to opportunities for healing and well-being. His message gives hope to the voiceless. Thompson and Pamela live in Maryland and have six beautiful children. In his spare time, **Thompson** composes ambient relaxation music that is available on all music media platforms under his artist's name "*Instrumental Witness*".



Today, **VSU** has six Colleges: The College of Agriculture, The Reginald F. Lewis College of Business, The College of Education, The College of Engineering and Technology, The College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and The College of Natural and Health Sciences. Collectively, these colleges offer 31 undergraduate degree programs, 17 graduate degree programs, two doctoral degree programs, and seven certificate programs. Additionally, **VSU** has a partnership program with the Peace Corps to prepare students for international service.



Reginald F. Lewis of East Baltimore, Maryland was one the most successful businessmen in the 1980s. The **VSU** graduate went on to Harvard Law School and helped set up Wall Street's first African American law firm in 1968. This law firm was the first to help minority businesses structure their finances and investments. His company also became a special council to *General Foods and Equitable Life*. **Lewis'** personal drive for making business deals became prevalent when he invested in the then struggling company, McCall Pattern Company. Under **Lewis's** command, the company turned its highest profit margin in its 113-year history. He sold the company for nearly triple the amount of his primary investment.

After enjoying his success from his first business venture, **Lewis** went back to work. **Lewis** purchased *Beatrice Foods*, an international food supplier. **Lewis helped turned the \$925 million dollar company into a \$1.5 billion dollar company. This success led him to become the first African American to own and operate a billion-dollar business in the United States.** In 1993, his life was cut short due to brain cancer. However, the <u>Reginald F. Lewis Foundation</u> continues to fulfill Lewis' legacy and vision through generous philanthropy. The foundation contributes to the education and advancement for minorities. The foundation started the **Museum of African American History and Culture in Baltimore, Maryland**. Numerous scholarship programs and aid have been given to selected universities and colleges, both domestic and foreign. In 2010, the foundation donated \$1.5 million to **VSU** which led to the College of Business being named the **Reginald F. Lewis College of Business**. <u>Click Here for more!</u>




Name: <u>Virginia Union University</u> Location: Richmond, Virginia Type: 4-year, Private Campus Setting: Mid-sized City Net Price: \$21,417* **Virginia Union University's (VUU)** roots go back to 1865 when the American Baptist Home Mission Society (ABHMS) came to Richmond, Virginia as teachers and missionaries. The ABHMS established, and was officially holding classes for, Richmond Theological School for Freedmen, one of the four institutions forming the "Union" that gives **VUU** its name. ABHMS proposed a "National Theological Institute" designed primarily at providing education and training for African Americans to enter the Baptist ministry; and soon this mission would expand into offering courses and programs at college, high school, and even preparatory levels, to both men and women.


Today, **Virginia Union University** is a premier liberal arts urban institution of higher education and center of excellence for the preparation of students and the development of leaders for tomorrow's world.

Knowing the importance of education, she moved to Denmark, South Carolina and started the first of several schools in the rural area.

Wright founded Denmark Industrial School in 1897, modeling it after **Tuskegee**. New Jersey philanthropist Ralph Voorhees and his wife donated \$5,000 to buy the land and build the first building, allowing the school to open in 1902. **Voorhees** students today combine intellect and faith as they prepare for professional careers. They learn to thrive in a diverse global society while pursuing lifelong learning, healthy living and an abiding faith in God. They aim to improve their communities, society and themselves.

Katherine Johnson was born in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia in 1918. By 13, Johnson was attending the high school on the campus of **West Virginia State College**. At 18, she enrolled in the college itself and graduated with highest honors in 1937. She then took a job teaching at a black public school in Virginia. When West Virginia decided to quietly integrate its graduate schools in 1939, West Virginia State's president, Dr. John W. Davis, selected her and two men to be the first black students offered spots at the state's flagship school, **West Virginia University**. In 1952, Johnson learned about open positions at the all-black West Area Computing Section at the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics' (NACA's) Langley laboratory.

The 1957 launch of the Soviet satellite Sputnik changed history—and **Johnson's** life. In 1957, she provided some of the math for the 1958 document Notes on Space Technology, a compendium of a series of 1958 lectures given by engineers in the Flight Research Division and the Pilotless Aircraft Research Division. In 1960, she and engineer Ted Skopinski coauthored *Determination of Azimuth Angle at Burnout for Placing a Satellite Over a Selected Earth Position*, a report laying out the equations describing an orbital spaceflight in which the landing position of the spacecraft is specified. **It was the first time a woman in the Flight Research Division had received credit as an author of a research report**. *Johnson* retired in 1986, after *33 years at Langley*. **In 2015, at age 97, President Barack Obama awarded Johnson the Presidential Medal of Freedom, America's highest civilian honor.** In 2016, the movie *Hidden Figures* was released based on the book of the same name. *Hidden Figures* chronicled the life of **Johnson** and other black female "computers" of her era.



Tolson (Denzel Washington) at **Wiley College**. The real Wiley team instead defeated the University of Southern California, who at the time were the reigning debating champions. Though they beat the reigning champions, **Wiley** was not allowed to officially call themselves victors, because they were not full members of the debate society; blacks were not admitted until after World War II. However, in 2019, **Wiley** returned to their victorious position as rising champions of the debate society!

Stephen Anthony Smith is a sports commentator on ESPN. Alongside Max Kellerman, Smith is a featured commentator on ESPN's First Take, a show reviewing daily sports news. Smith's parents came from the United States Virgin Islands. Smith was born in the Bronx, New York on October 14, 1967. He was raised in Queens with five other siblings. He attended the Fashion Institute of Technology for one year and was then granted a basketball scholarship to study at Winston-Salem State University; which he graduated from in 1991. In college, he wrote for *The New Argus* and published an article saying that his basketball coach, Clarence Gaines, needed to retire. This article shocked a lot of people because Gaines was a revered figure at Winston-Salem State. The article, however, also revealed Smith as an aspiring journalist who was not afraid to express controversial views. Upon graduation, Smith was hired by the Winston-Salem Journal and began writing as a clerk in the sports department. He later held reporter positions at the Greensboro News and Record and at the New York Daily News. But Smith spent the most part of his career as a reporter for the *Philadelphia (Pennsylvania) Inquirer* for 16 years. He was hired there in 1994 and successively served as an NBA writer, an NBA columnist, and was eventually promoted in 2003 to the General Sports Columnist for the newspaper. That same year, Smith decided to join ESPN after the television broadcast network contacted him. In 2010, he resumed his columnist activity for the newspaper. In 2014, he started his own daily show, The Stephen A. Smith Show. It was first aired in New York and Los Angeles, California. Since January 2018, it is broadcast nation-wide. Smith has also been featured in a morning show on Fox Radio Sports. He's mainly known for his contribution to ESPN's First Take which he joined permanently in 2012.


Founded in 1925, Xavier University of Louisiana (XULA) has the distinction of being the only Roman Catholic HBCU. It is also the only HBCU founded by a saint, as Katharine Drexel was canonized in 2000. Xavier is located in New Orleans, Louisiana and offers the attention and support offered at a smaller university balanced with the character and fun found in the Big Easy.

Xavier is known for its pre-med, pharmacy and dual-degree engineering programs. Xavier routinely ranks number one among Location: New Orleans, Louisiana American colleges and universities in placing black students in medical school. They also have early assurance agreements with seven medical schools (Tulane University, University of Rochester, St. Louis University, Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth, Michigan State University College of Human Medicine, Penn State and Baylor College of Medicine). Xavier's pharmacy program places in the top four colleges of pharmacy graduating Black students with a PharmD.



The first African American to become the U.S. Secretary of Labor, Alexis M. Herman was born in Mobile, Alabama, on July 16, 1947. Her mother was a teacher in Mobile and her father was the first black politician elected in the South since Reconstruction. Herman attended Xavier University in New Orleans, where she became a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. Herman began her career in 1969 as a social worker for Catholic Charities, developing employment training opportunities for unemployed youth. From there, she was hired by the Department of Labor. At age twenty-nine, Herman became the youngest person to hold the position of Director of the Women's Bureau, and while there, Herman pressured Delta Airlines and Coca-Cola to hire female professionals. It was also during this time that she met future President Bill Clinton. She formed A.M. Herman & Associates in 1981, advising state and local governments on labor markets until 1989. She also later became the National Director of the Minority Women Employment Program of R-T-P, Inc., where she established programs to place minority women in white-collar and nontraditional jobs.

Returning to government service in 1989, Herman joined the Democratic National Committee as chief of staff on the suggestion of longtime friend Ron Brown, and by 1992 was the CEO of the Democratic National Convention. After Clinton's election in 1992, Herman was appointed assistant to the president and director of the White House Public Liaison Office in 1993. When Clinton was reelected, he appointed her the twenty-third secretary of labor. Her appointment was not without controversy, however, as many labor leaders did not support her. Later, Herman would be implicated in one of the improper fundraisers held at the White House. She weathered both of these storms unscathed, continuing to fight for minority and women's rights in the workplace.

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The Impact of Black Greek-Letter Sororities and Fraternities on Society is Unparalleled!

Black Greek-letter sororities and fraternities have been a pivotal part of African American history and culture since the early 20th century. Primarily launched on HBCU campuses, these organizations have been a central resource for support and service in the educational advancement and strengthening of social bonds among black students, entrepreneurs and professionals, especially when the organizations expanded to majority white institutions of higher learning. Also, they were a way to combat racism, as many campus organization memberships were exclusionary to students and professionals of color.

The pioneer black Greek-letter organizations have become known as **The Divine Nine**, and among their ranks have been some of the most influential leaders of color in healthcare, fashion, business, global affairs, politics and more. Among the ranks of black fraternities are leaders from **W. E. B. DuBois, Martin Luther King Jr.,** and **Al Sharpton** to **Hill Harper, Al Roker, Emmitt Smith, Robert Johnson**, and hundreds of thousands more. **Divine Nine sororities** boast an impressive roster of members as well; from **Shirley Chisholm** and **Loretta Lynch** to **Nikki Giovanni**, **Soledad O'Brien**, **MC Lyte**, and many more.

Since these nine were started and incorporated, membership has spread globally, with chapters in Asia, the Caribbean, Europe and Africa. Their impact is also widespread professionally and financially, as they have contributed millions to uplift communities, send students to college via scholarships and support professionals in both corporate America and entrepreneurship via mentorship and sponsorship. <u>Click Here for more!</u>

On May 10, 1930, on the campus of **Howard University**, in Washington DC, the **National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC)** was formed as a permanent organization with the following charter members: **Omega Psi Phi** and **Kappa Alpha Psi** Fraternities, and **Alpha Kappa Alpha**, **Delta Sigma Theta** and **Zeta Phi Beta Sororities**. 
