Have you completed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid?

All students who are planning to attend a 4- or 2- year college, community college, technical, trade, or career school should complete the FAFSA!!!

The FAFSA application opened OCTOBER 1st of last year.

Completing the FAFSA is the KEY to being considered for most types of aid. The sooner you complete the FAFSA, the better opportunity you will have to receive money to help pay for your post-secondary education.

The FAFSA helps to determine your eligibility for federal loans, grants, work-study funds, and financial aid from the state and colleges. Many colleges require the FAFSA to be completed before a student is awarded need-based and/or merit-based financial aid.

The FAFSA is the first step in the financial aid process.

Applying for Scholarships and the Charles County Scholarship Fund, Inc.:

Types of Financial Aid

There are four main types of financial aid students can receive to help fund their education: **GRANTS, SCHOLARSHIPS, STUDENT LOANS, and WORK STUDY**. Of those four options, applying for scholarships that do not have to be repaid is a priority on the college-bound student's to-do list. Few students receive scholarships unexpectedly. Maximizing your chances of receiving a scholarship requires research. Applying for scholarships can be a daunting task. However, by following some basic guidelines in applying, students can reap some valuable awards.



Scholarships

As you apply to schools, you can search for scholarships by looking at the school's website. You can also contact the school's financial aid office to find out about their scholarship opportunities. The financial aid office of prospective colleges is a great resource to find scholarships that are specific for that school. Ask about merit (academic), college specific, department specific, and non-need-based scholarship applications that may be available. Colleges differ in the number of scholarships offered, the amounts of the scholarships, the types, and the requirements for merit scholarships. Some merit scholarships require a nomination from a school counselor or administrator before you can be considered for a particular merit scholarship. Many of these have early fall deadlines for nominations to be submitted. Colleges offer scholarships based on talents like music, athletic abilities, and technical skills involving science and math. Some schools the freshmen are automatically considered for scholarships; other schools require students to complete additional scholarship applications. Be sure to do your research to find out how you can apply for scholarships for prospective colleges.

Local Scholarships

Applying for local scholarships through private organizations, corporations, religious organizations, unions, chambers of commerce, military, civic organizations (like the Rotary Club), or local companies is an excellent way to increase your chances of being selected for an award. Local scholarships are not as competitive as those scholarships offered at the national level through many internet database searches.

Charles County Scholarship Fund

One local source is the **Charles County Scholarship Fund, Inc.** The Charles County Scholarship Fund, Inc. is a non-profit organization that provides **multiple** scholarship opportunities to Charles County high school seniors. Graduating seniors who live in Charles County can apply for various local scholarships with **one** application. **The electronic online application will OPEN JANUARY 10TH and will be available on the following link!!!**

PRIOR to completing your application online, **PLEASE REVIEW** the following:

- **Application will be completed ONLINE!!!**
- **PLEASE NOTE: APPLICATION PROCESS CANNOT BE SAVED!!!**
- Please **REVIEW the application online FIRST** and make sure you have **ALL** required documents ready to upload to the application **PRIOR** to starting to complete the form.
- Please have the following **REQUIRED DOCUMENTS** ready to **UPLOAD** when you apply
- **Academic Letter of Recommendation** — The letter of recommendation must be from a teacher, school counselor or other school administrator.
- **Personal Letter of Recommendation** — Must be from someone who knows you well. (Not a parent or other family member)
- **Personal Statement Essay** — Your essay is a statement regarding your academic and career objectives, goals and aspirations. Your student statement is very important, and the Scholarship Committee relies heavily on this statement. Please include the following: What are your educational and career goals? Why have you chosen these goals? How do you envision contributing to your community after you complete your education?
- **Resume** — The resume must include: 1. Work Experience 2. Extracurricular activities 3. Community Service activities during high school 4. Leadership positions and 5. School and Community honors and awards.
- If you want to be considered for **need-based scholarships**, you will need to provide a **Copy of your 2022-23 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Student Aid Report (SAR)**. (Confirmation page will be available to you once you complete the FAFSA). All information supplied will be treated as confidential. The form is available at <https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa>.
- **All** scholarship applications must be **completed and submitted by Tuesday, March 1, 2022**.
- **Late applications will not be accepted.**
- Seniors should see Mrs. Jones, the College & Career Advisor, or your school counselor if they have any questions/concerns.
- Please ensure you have all required documents ready to upload to the application prior to starting to complete the form.

Researching Scholarships on the Internet

When researching scholarships outside your local area, scholarship information and resources are available in the Career Center / on the Career Center page of the North Point High School website, libraries, and bookstores. Publication guides providing information on scholarships and scholarship searches are also available for purchase through bookstores.

Using online scholarship databases can reveal an enormous number of scholarships for which you may be eligible to apply. Some may require an essay along with specific grade point average, gender, grade level; or ask for students who volunteer, students whose parents are in the military, or students with disabilities to name a few specifics. Recommending one particular internet scholarship matching service as the best is not possible. However, one can find many links to search for scholarships in the College and Career Center monthly newsletter. To access the Career Center page, please go to the North Point High School website www.ccboe.com/schools/northpoint) and **click** on the “*Academic*” tab at the top, then **click** on “*College and Career Center*” and it will take you to the Career Center page.

In conclusion, one thing is for sure. **YOU HAVE TO APPLY TO WIN!!!** Be advised that some companies may try to get you to pay for scholarship searches. **Please do not fall for the scam.** Most likely you will receive mail from organizations with official-sounding names that offer to find merit scholarships for you but will charge a fee. Unfortunately, these companies offer false hopes and use the student’s high school as if the student has been recommended for the award. Don’t fall for the “...scholarships and Honors cord offer for... \$60.” Only your student’s counselor or administrator can authorize honor cords to be worn at graduation

ceremonies. If you have any questions, please contact the school. **Do not pay for scholarship searches with all the free services available online and in the Career Center.**

Cost of Attendance

Costs of Attendance are **estimates** of the education expenses incurred by students during the nine-month academic year. These budgets include direct university charges (tuition, fees, and on-campus room and board) and estimates of indirect expenses (transportation, books, supplies, miscellaneous living expenses, and off-campus room and board). Off-campus cost of living expenses are determined based on the average room and board charges for the local area. These are indirect costs, not billed by the university.

January Grade Level Reminders:

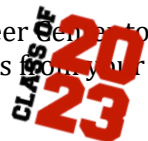
9th Grade:

- Remember to read and keep up your grades. **Freshman year DOES count.**
- Keep a list of volunteer experiences, extracurricular activities, awards, etc. to create a high school resume. A student involved is a productive student. Look on the Career Center page of the North Point High School website for a resume template.
- Think about what you want to do when you graduate from high. Use the **XELLO** link on your Office 365 Clever App to explore careers and colleges.

- Use the resources on College Board (SAT) and ACT websites to prepare for these tests. Map out what testing you need for your college admissions applications. Juniors should plan to take their first SAT and/or ACT no later than the end of their junior year!!! This will provide you the opportunity to retake the test again at the beginning of your senior year. Please REGISTER for these exams EARLY and don't miss the deadlines as expensive late fees apply.
- Make plans to visit colleges and attend college fairs...many **VIRTUAL and IN-PERSON** ones are available. Be sure to register for college visits on the college's website so you have the opportunity to attend an information session and take a tour of the campus.

CLASS OF
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12th Grade:

- Some colleges are still accepting applications for fall admission. Don't miss **DEADLINES** and be sure to make a copy of your paperwork. Check the status of your applications to make sure the admissions office has received **ALL REQUIRED** paperwork such as test scores from testing agencies, transcripts, letters of recommendation, and essays submitted electronically or mailed with sufficient postage. Be assertive as paper can be lost in the process.
- The **FAFSA** - Free Application for Federal Student Aid - has been available to complete since October 1st! If you have not filed your FAFSA yet, please be sure to do so as soon as possible as funding is distributed as forms are processed and FINANCIAL AID CAN RUN OUT. - Contact your College and Career Advisor if you have questions about financial aid. Some colleges require the CSS/Financial Aid Profile for financial aid consideration. Be sure you submit the appropriate forms for your prospective colleges. The CSS/Financial Aid Profile is available to complete at: <https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org/>
- Some colleges may expect to see your mid-year grades and/or transcript. Be sure to submit the mid-year report requested by your prospective colleges to your counselor. Informing admissions offices of additional information such as any accolades or awards you have received since submitting your admissions application is appropriate. You should also inform the admissions staff of any special projects or events you participated or higher SAT and/or ACT scores you have received.
- Seniors planning to attend the College of Southern Maryland (CSM) in the fall need to apply to CSM online at www.csmd.edu/apply-register as soon as possible so you can receive your student identification number and start receiving emails and/or text messages about what you need to do to register for classes. Seniors are required to show college readiness before they can enroll in college level classes at CSM. - Email copies of any **letters of acceptance** you receive as well as **scholarship** and **grant offers** or **military commitments** to your College and Career Advisor as soon as possible. The information is used to create the graduation program and state reports.
- Check the Career Center / Career Center page of the North Point High School website often for scholarship information and updates. The Career Center Newsletter and the Career Center page on the NPHS website

have a monthly newsletter with a **List of Scholarships**. You should **ALWAYS** check this List of Scholarships **FIRST!!!** Don't forget the **Charles County Scholarship Fund application** is electronic and will be available starting **JANUARY 10TH, 2022!** **Deadline for submission is March 1, 2022.**

All colleges accept scores from BOTH the ACT or SAT.

Students do not need to take both tests; however, some students find it helpful to take both tests to find out which test is better for them.

SAT Test (www.collegeboard.org)

Description: Comprised of one 65-minute reading section, one 25-minute math section (no calculator), one 55-minute section (with calculator), and one 35-minute writing and language section. College Board has removed the optional essay portion from the SAT. Scoring on each section ranges from 200-800 points.

When to take the test: Spring of your junior year and/or fall of your senior year. You may want to take the test more than once.

Tips and Strategies: Your score is based on the number of correct answers ONLY. If you aren't sure, take a guess – it can't hurt you and it could help. Harder questions are worth the same amount as easy ones. Answer the easy questions first and leave the more time-consuming questions till the end.

ACT TEST (www.act.org)

Description: Comprised of one 45-minute English section, one 60-minute math section, one 35-minute reading section, one 35-minute science section, and an optional writing section (essay) that is 40-minutes. Scores on each section range from 1 – 36. The composite ACT score is the average of your scores on the four sections and ranges from 1 – 36. A perfect score is 36.

When to take the test: Spring of your junior year and/or fall of your senior year. You may want to take the test more than once.

Tips and Strategies: Your score is based on the number of correct answers ONLY. If you aren't sure, take a guess – it can't hurt you and it could help. Harder questions are worth the same amount as easy ones. Answer the easy questions first and leave the more time-consuming questions till the end.

Transcript Policy



Students have several options regarding transcripts.

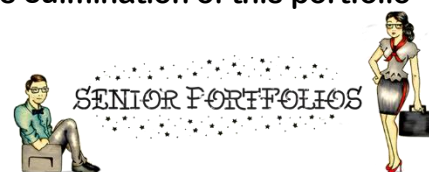
- Each senior is given one free unofficial transcript in October.
- All seniors will receive a free official final copy, mailed to the school/employer/etc. of their choice.
- All seniors will have a free unofficial copy included in their high school diploma envelope at the end of the year.
- A transcript request form must be completed for each transcript and payment should be made at the time of request. The forms are available in the Counseling Office or on the school's website.

Seniors must give the Counseling Office a minimum of five school days to complete their transcript requests unless extensive additional paperwork is required.

All transcript requests and other related forms should be turned in to the Counseling Secretary. Do not give them to your Counselor.

SENIOR PORTFOLIO INTERVIEWS – SPRING

ALL SENIORS will complete a Senior Portfolio before graduation. The culmination of this portfolio project is the Senior Portfolio Interview that will occur during the spring of their senior year. Mrs. Jones will arrange for each senior to present his or her portfolio in a mock interview situation. We are in the process of finalizing the details for this year's interview process. Parents may participate in this project by volunteering to interview students. If you are interested, you will be asked to volunteer for one session of interviews. Attention all 17 and 18 year old male students: If you are not registered with Selective Service, you must do so within 30 days of turning 18. You MUST register. This is not a school requirement, it's the law. If you fail to register, it will affect your ability to receive Federal college loans, grants and student aid. In addition, it will affect your ability to receive job training or to gain citizenship. It will even curtail opportunities to get many good jobs in the future. Sons and daughters must be between the ages of 18 and 26. Spousal benefits end 10 years from the date the VA finds the spouse as eligible or from the date of death of the veteran. ThanksUSA is a non-profit tax-exempt charitable organization focused on thanking American troops. ThanksUSA “thanks” the men and women of the United State Armed Forces by awarding scholarships for their children and spouses. As many as 500 scholarships are available for undergraduate study at accredited two- and four-year institutions of higher education. A minimum GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale is required. Active duty US military personnel is defined as having served on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard for at least 180 days since September 11, 2001, including all members of the Armed Forces who were killed or wounded in action. (Members of the reserves who have been activated to full-time duty and federalized members of the National Guard are eligible.) Dependent children (including adopted and stepchildren) must be age 24 and under as of the deadline. The scholarship program opens on April 1 and the deadline is May 15. Recipients are selected based on financial need, academic performance, leadership and community service. HIGH SCHOOL SCIENTIFIC TRAINING AND ENRICHMENT PROGRAM (HiSTEP)

The National Institute of Health (NIH) Office of Intramural Training & Education and Office of Scientific Workforce Diversity are proud to host the ***High School Scientific Training and Enrichment Program (HiSTEP)***. The goal of HiSTEP is to expand the pipeline of students interested in biomedical and healthcare careers by providing opportunities for high school students from schools with a large population of financially-disadvantaged students. We encourage **current high school juniors** interested in STEM-M (science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and medically-related) fields to apply.

Students of color who are U.S. citizens, in Grades 9 to 12 and who are amateurs are eligible to participate in ACT-SO. A community-based enrichment program, ACT-SO pairs students with volunteer instructors and mentors to develop projects and take part in enrichment opportunities like workshops, tutorials, and field trips. The interest areas are in STEM, business, humanities, performing visual and culinary arts, and hospitality management.

Local ACT-SO competitions and ceremonies highlight projects, research and work completed by students. Competition winners at the local level receive medals and prizes provided by local and regional sponsors and contributors. - **Virtual Locker** – Students can collect and store information that may be useful when they apply such as academic documents, essays, written work, extracurricular activities, videos, photos, visual arts/music, etc.

- **Collaboration Platform** – The teachers, counselors, employers, and mentors who are supporting the student's college search and application can offer feedback.
- **Application Portal** – Students select the information from their Virtual Locker that they wish to include with their application to Coalition member universities.

There are over 150 public and private universities across the U.S. that comprise the Coalition for College.

Overview of the Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship



The Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship is a **last dollar scholarship** that is available to students who enroll at a Maryland community college and now has **NO SERVICE OBLIGATION REQUIREMENT OR AGE REQUIREMENTS**. Eligible students can receive **up to \$5,000** to cover **any remaining** tuition and mandatory fee expenses after Federal or State Financial aid has been applied.

Who May Apply?

A high school graduate or GED recipient who is planning to enroll, or is currently enrolled at a Maryland community college as a candidate in:

- a credit-bearing vocational certificate;
 - a credit-bearing certificate;
 - an associate degree program;
 - a sequence of credit or non-credit courses that leads to licensure or certification; or
 - a registered apprenticeship program.
- Applicants must be eligible for in-state tuition, as determined by the community college in accordance with Title 15 of the Education Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland;
- High school applicants must have earned an unweighted cumulative GPA of at least a 2.3 (or its equivalent):
 - At the end of the first semester of their senior year in high school; or
 - At the end of their senior year in high school
- **Applicants who graduated from high school, five or more years before the date of application, are not subject to the GPA requirements for an initial award.**
- Applicants whose annual adjusted gross income was not more than:
 - \$100,000 if the applicant is single or resides in a single-parent household; or
 - \$150,000 if the applicant is married or resides in a two-parent household for the 2018 tax year as defined by MHEC;
- Applicants who have not earned a bachelor's degree or an associate degree; and
- Applicants who have not been awarded other educational grants or scholarships that cover the full cost of attendance at community colleges.

Application Requirements

1. Submit a completed Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at <https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa> **or** the Maryland State Financial Aid Application (MSFAA) online through MDCAPS for any applicant who is ineligible to receive federal aid but is eligible for in-state tuition by **March 1**;
2. Applicants who meet the income requirements as reported on their FAFSA or MSFAA by **March 1** will be notified by email of the required documentation to submit for the Scholarship. Applicants should login to their MDCAPS account and review their "To Do List" section for a complete listing of all required documentation that must be submitted to MHEC by **July 31 (Late submissions will not be accepted)**.

Enrollment Requirements

- All eligible applicants **must** attend the community college located in their county, or in the case of a regional community college, the region in which they live. However, if the community college located where the student lives **does not** offer the degree or program in which they enrolled, the student may attend any other Maryland community college that offers that program;
- Applicants who plan to enroll as candidates in credit-bearing vocational certificates, credit-bearing certificates, or associate degrees **must** enroll in and complete at least 12 credits per semester at a community college; and
- Applicants who plan to enroll in a sequence of credit or non-credit courses that leads to licensure or certification must enroll in the next available courses offered at the community college for their sequence.

Important Reminder

Applicants who listed a **four-year** institution on their FAFSA or MSFAA, and now plan to attend a community college, may change their school of choice in **one** of the following ways prior to the **deadline of July 31**:

- Go to the student's Maryland College Aid Processing System (MDCAPS) account and click on the "Enrollment" tab; or
- Go to the student's completed Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or completed Maryland State Financial Aid Application (MSFAA) to add the new college.

Students will be notified by an email from MHEC (Maryland Higher Education Commission) of the required documentation to submit for further consideration of the Scholarship. 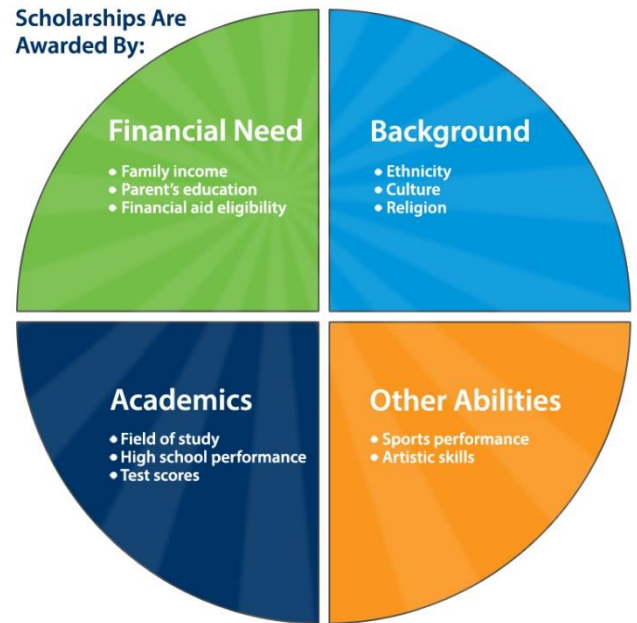

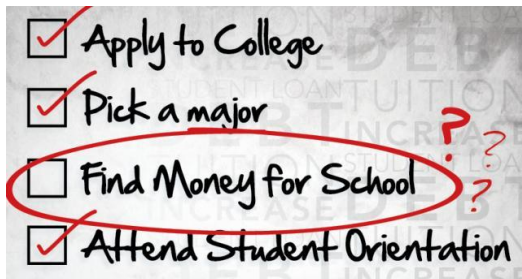

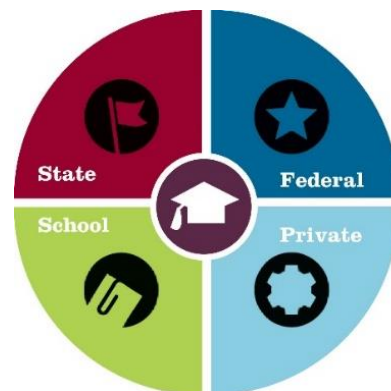
