Freshman and Sophomores – Building your Academic Resume is key for you. Make sure to check out all the different clubs and tutoring offered during MiniNEST.



Seniors and Sr. Parents/Guardians - Have you completed the Free Application Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)?

The FAFSA application opened up on October 1st of this year. Completing the FAFSA is the key to being considered for most types of aid. The sooner you complete the FAFSA, the better opportunity you will have to receive money to help pay for college.

- When completing the FAFSA it is essential that you refer to the official instructions provided by the U.S. Department of Education. The Class of 2022 will complete the 2022-2023 FAFSA.
- It is extremely important that the FAFSA be filed as soon as possible. You will use the information from your 2020 taxes. It is recommended that you and your parent use the IRS Data Retrieval Option presented to you on the FAFSA application. It is important that your information be entered into the federal database as early as possible. If you wait too long, many sources of money will be exhausted.
- The FAFSA will not be processed without the appropriate signatures. If filing on-line students must either, generate a signature page and mail it or sign the FAFSA electronically. Students may electronically sign their FAFSA and make corrections to the FAFSA on the web if they have registered for the FSA ID. If you do not already have an FSA ID, you can create one when logging in to fafsa.gov.
- Everyone who is considering some type of post-secondary education (any accredited 4-year or 2-year college, technical, trade, or business school) should file a FAFSA. Even if you believe your income is too high to qualify for Federal aid, you must file the FAFSA to be eligible for student loans and many scholarships or grants. If you wait to file your FAFSA until your plans for next fall are definite, many of the sources of money will be exhausted.
- Be sure that you do not miss any deadlines. If you are applying to MD State schools your FAFSA should filed by February 15th in order to meet the State Financial Aid deadline of March 1st. In order to be eligible for Maryland State Programs, you must list a Maryland school on the FAFSA. Even if a Maryland school may not be your first choice, list it first so that you are assured of being entered into the state's database.

Make sure your FAFSA is accurate, complete, and it is signed.

Get free information and help from the financial aid office at the college or career school you plan to attend, or the U.S. Department of Education at www.StudentAid.ed.gov or (1-800-433-3243). Free help is available any time during the application process. You should never have to pay for help.

The Student Aid Report (SAR) and Why It's Important

The Student Aid Report (SAR) summarizes all of the information you provided on your FAFSA. Your SAR will contain your Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which is the number used in determining your eligibility for federal student aid.

- You will receive your SAR by email within 3-5 days after your FAFSA has been processed, if you provided an email address when you applied. This email will contain a secure link so you can access your SAR online. If you have a "junk" folder or "spam" folder in your email files, check it. The email from FAFSA might be delivered there instead of your inbox. You should add the email address, **noreply@FAFSA.gov**, to your email address book to help avoid delivery problems.
- If you do not provide a valid email address on your FAFSA form, you will receive a paper SAR by mail 7-10 days after your FAFSA had been processed.

Financial Need and Expected Family Contribution (EFC)

Aid for most programs is awarded based on financial need (except for unsubsidized Stafford Loans, PLUS Loans, and TEACH Grants). The EFC is a measure of your family's financial strength and resources that should be available to help pay for your education.

The EFC is calculated from the information you report on the FAFSA and according to a formula established by law. Your family's income (taxable and untaxed) and assets are considered in determining your EFC. Your family size and number of family members who will be attending a college or career school are also considered. Your EFC will appear on the Student Aid Report SAR you receive after you file your FAFSA. To determine your financial need for federal student aid programs (except for the unsubsidized Stafford Loan), your school subtracts the Expected Family Contribution (EFC) from your cost of attendance.

Determining Your Financial Need

Your Expected Family Contribution (EFC) is used to determine your financial need:

Cost of Attendance (COA) - Expected Family Contribution (EFC) = Financial Need

The college or university uses federal grants and other financial aid to meet your financial need. Because the EFC formula must be applied to each family's information, we cannot tell you whether you will be eligible for federal student aid or estimate how much aid you might receive. After you receive your SAR, you will also receive award letters from the school(s) listed on your FAFSA that offer you admission. Contact the financial aid office at the school(s) that sent you an award letter if you have questions about your student financial aid award.

- Study hard and keep up your grades. Use your PSAT results to develop a prepping strategy to improve test scores.
- Use **XELLO** to hone in on your career path and further your college research.
- Start test prep for spring exams at <u>www.StudyIsland.com</u>.
- Review your Academic Resume to expand your strengths. Begin to narrow resume down to one page.

Seniors:

- Decide which post-secondary option(s) you are going to pursue. Know the actionable tasks necessary for each option.
- Finish submitting your college applications.
- CSM's online application is free and you can apply at this time.
- Register for college tests needed. Be sure to send test scores directly from the testing agencies to your colleges, scholarship programs, and NCAA.
- Create your FSA ID to complete the FAFSA. The FAFSA was available starting October 1st.
- Continue to work on scholarship applications and additional financial aid sources. Keep copies of everything. Review the College & Career Center newsletter for scholarship announcements.
- Provide Ms. Jones a copy of your school acceptance letters, enlistment papers, job offers, and scholarship awards.

<u>Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship</u> The Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship is a <u>last dollar</u> scholarship that is available to students who enroll at a Maryland community college. Eligible student can receive up to \$5,000 to cover any remaining tuition and mandatory fee expenses **after** Federal or state financial aid has been applied.

Who May Apply? A Maryland high school graduate or GED recipient eligible for in-state tuition who is planning to enroll or is currently enrolled as a full-time (12 credits semester for credit-bearing courses) student at a Maryland community college

How do I apply? Submit either the <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid</u> (FAFSA) OR <u>Maryland State Financial Aid Application</u> (MSFAA) by **March 1**. The MSFAA should only be completed by undocumented individuals who are ineligible to receive federal financial aid

GPA Requirement an unweighted cumulative 2.3 GPA at the end of the **first semester** of their senior year in high school or by the **end** of their senior year in high school.

Income Requirements Students must be within the required adjusted gross income limits based on the 2020 tax year:

- \$100,000 if the applicant is single or resides in a single parent household; or
- \$150,000 if the applicant is married or resides in a two parent household.

March 1: FINAL deadline to submit the FAFSA or MSFAA
 June 1: AWARDING performed for renewal recipients
 DEADLINE to submit all required documentation
 AWARDING performed for initial applicants

Testing



College Entrance Exams

Many colleges require scores from the ACT or SAT tests as a part of the college admissions process. Most high school students take the ACT, SAT, or both June of their junior year. If you need to raise your score, then August, September, or even October of your Senior year. Typically, these scores are just one piece of the college applications. College admissions officers will review these test scores alongside your high school GPA, the classes you took in high school, letters of recommendation, extracurricular activities, and personal essays. How important these scores are in the college application process varies from school to school. Overall, the higher you score on the ACT and/or SAT, the more options for attending and paying for college will be available to you. Most colleges and universities will accept scores from either the SAT or ACT, and do not favor one test over the other. It is important to note that before COVID-19, the ACT was looking at offering individual section retakes (versus retaking the entire test). The best way to decide if taking the SAT, ACT, or both tests is right for you is to take a timed full-length practice test of each. No matter which test you choose, a well-structured study plan that you stick to is necessary.

PSAT/NMSQT

The PSAT is a great primer for the SAT, and even the ACT, The PSAT won't count towards your college admissions applications, but it is the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship. The highest scoring Juniors may win scholarship money. The PSAT is 2 hours and 45 minutes, with sections of Math, Evidence-Based Reading and Writing. The maximum score is 1520. <u>FairTest:</u> The validity of these tests as accurate indicators of college readiness and success have been debated. Add COVID-19 and many colleges have gone test-optional for admissions. This website includes institutions that are "test optional", "test flexible" or otherwise de-emphasize the use of standardized tests by making admissions decisions about substantial numbers of applicants who recently graduated from U.S. high schools without using the SAT or ACT. The SAT exam is offered nationally every year in August, October, November, December, March, May, and June. There are two sections consisting of Math and Evidence-Based Reading and Writing. The ACT consists of four sections: English, Reading, Math, and Science. There is an optional essay. The ACT is 2 hours and 55 minutes (without the essay). Each section of the ACT is scored on a 1 to 36 point scale. Your composite ACT score is the average of your four section scores, also on a scale from 1 to 36. Athletically Related Financial Aid:

Athletic scholarships are awarded by NCAA Divisions I and II colleges and universities. Division III colleges and universities do not award financial aid based on athletic ability, but you may be eligible to receive academic scholarships or need-based financial aid.

In fact, according to the NCAA Eligibility Center, very few high school athletes earn athletic scholarships. According to recent statistics, about two percent of high school athletes are awarded athletic scholarships to compete in college. This small number means high school student-athletes and their parents need to have realistic expectations about receiving an athletic scholarship to play college sports. Academic, not athletic, achievement is the most reliable path to success in life.
